Extract of a letter from an Officer in the City of Limerick Militia, dated Castle-Pollard, March 22.—“A Corporal of the name of Ferguson, and 12 of our Men, who are quartered at Scrabby, in the Co. Longford, has just taken up 17 notorious robbers in that neighbourhood;—one fellow had a passage under ground from his own house into a field, the opening of which was through a ditch, covered occasionally with fods; the soldier who had been planted near this place, by chance perceived the fods fall in, and a man's head make its appearance, on which he presented his musket, which caused the robber to attempt making his escape, but before he could do so, the soldier fired and lodged a ball in his leg, he was consequently secured, and, with sixteen accomplices taken by Ferguson and his party, sent to Cavan gaol, where they will be tried the ensuing Assizes.”

We seldom presume to lecture those legally authorized to administer justice,—it therefore will be received as intended, when we point out some regulations adopted by the present Lord Mayor of Dublin, and which we know are as fully applicable to Limerick.

The Lord Mayor, in his proclamation, promises a reward of Two Guineas to any person who shall give him information, and prosecute to conviction, any coal factor or other person who shall buy coals from any captain of a coal ship, or other person who shall bring coal to market, and afterwards sell out of said ship said coals to the public. [In this City, if there are no frauds in the sale of coals, it is presumed, the article *Turf*, warrants similar attention.]

His Lordship calls upon the Church Wardens and other Parish Officers to assist him in correcting the infamous practice of dram-drinking, particularly on Sunday mornings, and that they will call in a select few of their parishioners to perambulate the streets and lanes of this city and its suburbs every Sunday morning, particularly during divine service, and detect and put an end to said abominable custom, and his Lordship pledges himself to give them every assistance in punishing offenders herein to the utmost rigour of the law.

His Lordship also gives notice, that all swine and pigs which are found in the streets after the 20th of this instant (March) shall be taken up and sent to the House of Industry.

His Lordship also strictly charges and commands that no person, man or woman, do presume to interfere in the sale of fish, landed at the quays, or fish market, as if they do, his Lordship is determined to punish them as offenders, with the utmost rigour of the law.
