Wednesday se'nnight, a trial for crim. con, came on at York, in England, in which a Mr. Baldwin of that country, was Plaintiff, and Richard Oliver, Efq; late of the co. of Limerick, efendant.

The former charged the latter with having had a criminal intercourse with his wife for upwards of three years, who was the daughter of the late Sir Nathaniel Barry, of this city, which he endeavoured to prove by evidence.

Counfellor Erskine appeared in behalf of the Defendant, and very ably defended his client .-

In the course of his defence he highly reprobated the manner in which the parents of the female in question had brought her up, who not content with accomplishing her with education, they made upon her account a private theatre in their own house in Dublin, where the seeds of virtue had been blafted, and to which might be afcribed the propensities of which her husband now complained.

He dwelt for a confiderable time upon the evils that must result from private theatres, which he faid were no better than lures for gallantry and debauchery, and faid that in any city where they were permitted, encroachments upon conjugal boundaries would be very frequently heard of. The Jury brought in a verdict of One Shilling for the Plaintiff.

Our correspondent mentions, that many females in the tow of York, were so interested in favour of Mr. Oliver, that when the trial was over, the decision of which they considered equal to an acquittal, they wore white cockades, as tellimonies of joy.

House of Commons .- SATURDAY, MARCH 26. Mr. Secretary Pelham moved, that the House do at its rifing this day adjourn until Tuesday next, which was agreed to.

Reported the bill for rendering more effectual the laws for preventing encroachments, and the committing of waste on Commons his kingdom. Ordered, that the faid bill be engroffed; it was afterwards read a third time, passed, and ordered to the Lords.

Read a third time, paffed, and ordered to the Lords; the bill for directing the application of the fum of 5,500l. granted by Parliament, to the Dublin Society, for the improvement of husbandry and other useful arts; also, the bill to empower the Commissioners of his Majesty's revenue, with the approbation of the Lord Lieutenant, to erect Light Houses around the coasts of this kingdom, and to levy a tonnage duty on all shipping.

A message from the Lords, by two of the Masters in Chancery, that they had agreed to the bill for improving and repairing the road leading from Dublin to Navan without any amendments; also that the Lords had agreed to the bill for regulating the iffuing of licences for the fale of spirituous liquors by retail, and for remedying the abuses which have arisen from the immoderate use of such liquors, which were ordered to the Lord Lieutenant for transmittion. -House adjourned to Tuesday next.

Ennis, March 28. Yesterday a person of the name of Keliher unfortunately shot one Quin who lived near Ennistymon. It feems that Keliher had a warrant against Quin, and on arresting him, presented a pistol at his head, which went off and killed him on the spot. Keliher has been fecured, and was this day conveyed to town and lodged in jail.

Yesterday Jones Harrison, Esq; and his new married lady arrived at his father's house in this town, upon which occasion the inhabitants shewed fuch tokens I esteem and affection, as must prove highly nattering to him and his friends .-At night the town was brilliantly illuminated, and bonfires lighted up in different parts thereof.

aforesaid, That in every suit which shall be brought after the passing of this Act, by any Master manufacturer against any Undertaker or Journeyman, or by any Undertaker or Journeyman against a Master or Employer, for or on account of any work done, or undertaken or outitted, or neglected to be done, or for materials damaged or embezzled, or for payment of wages, the Plaintiff shall before he or she, shall be allowed to commence fuch fuit or action in any court of law, file his or her effidavit, ferting forth, "That fince the commencement of this Act, he or she had not entered into or acceded directly or indirectly to any unlawful combination, or forced, or endeavoured to force any perfon to accede to fuch, or take any compulfory or illegal oath, and that he or she has not since the faid time entered into any agreement not to buy goods from any particular person or place," and if in any fuch fuit the Defendant or Defendants shall prove that the Plaintiff or Plaintiffs have committed any of the faid Acts since the time aforesaid, notwithstanding such Affidavit shall be filed, judgment shall be given for the Defendant or Defendants, with full costs."
