Session of Parliament has passed over without a call of the House.
Letters from Greenock, by the Scotch mails, arrived here yesterday, give melancholy details of the dreadful distresses sustained by the inhabitants of all the western parts of Scotland, in consequence of the shutting up of the Irish ports against the exportation of oats and meal; and it is computed, that there is not in North Britain, at this time, grain, flour or meal, sufficient for even a scanty consumption to the first of May next; from Hamburgh or the Baltic, they expect little relief, as all which comes to the shipping ports, is immediately bought up at any price, for the London market.

By a letter from Enniskillen, we are informed, that the trial of Mr. John Croker, and his apprentice, T. Coogan, came on at the assizes, held for the county of Fermanagh, on Saturday last, before Tankerville Chamberlaine, Esq; one of the Justices of his Majesty's court of King's Bench.

The prisoners were indicted on the information of Thomas Clarke, sworn before H. St. George Cole, Esq; and the indictment charged Mr. Croker with administering, and Coogan with taking an unlawful oath, to the following purport: "Not to mention any thing he heard or saw."

Clarke, in giving evidence, said, that Croker was head gardener to Lord Belmore; that he saw a number of men, with a militia man among them, on Lord Belmore's demesne, and that from a voice he heard, he thought Mr. Croker was there exercising the men. On another night, he saw a light in the muthroom house near the garden; that he lay on his belly, looked in and listened, saw Croker take out a paper, lay down a book, and that Coogan took up the book, kissed it, and said he would never tell what he heard or saw. There were 12 or 13 other persons present, and he saw the appearance of guns.

He underwent a long cross examination by Counsellor M'Nally, who came down specially from Dublin, for the prisoners, in the course of which, he acknowledged he had been a thief, convicted of stealing laths off Lord Belmore's demesne, and had been prosecuted by Mr. Croker. That he was innocently convicted by the Jury, though the laths were found upon him, &c. &c. He repeatedly varied from his original evidence, and shewed every appearance of a man acting from motives of malice.

Two witnesses were called to support this fellow's consistency, by swearing that he had informed them of the facts he swore to, previous to his lodging informations against Mr. Croker.

On the part of Mr. Croker, Mr. Gaffry, purveyor to the Jail, deposed, that he overheard Clarke, and another prisoner, plotting the present prosecution, while Clarke was in prison under sentence for the theft.

Captain Cole, the Magistrate, (who acknowledged he conducted this prosecution,) and others, gave Mr. Croker a most excellent character; and the learned Judge in charging the Jury, declared he thought they ought not to hesitate for a moment, in bringing in a verdict of acquittal.

The Jury after retiring for a few minutes brought in their verdict Not Guilty.

The prisoners had been tried at the preceding assizes, before Mr. Justice Downes for the same offence, but the Jury not agreeing in their verdict, were brought to the verge of the county, and there discharged.

On Monday last departed this life, at his house in Bride-street, that long revered and truly respectable citizen, Travers Hartly, Esq; merchant, and late representative for this city in Parliament: a man who throughout a long life, exhibited in his own person, a bright example of public and private virtues, often emulated, but never exceeded.
