

and, and the money dealers continued to keeply into the ocean of speculation. The assizes of Armagh commenced on Tuesday though the Court sat at ten o'clock, little business was done. Sixteen records entered, and the calendar is remarkably there being upwards of 80 prisoners, and persons out on bail, to stand trial.

Coyle, a merchant of Lisburn, was brought to the bar on motion, (on Monday) when he presented a petition, by virtue of the habeas corpus praying to be tried at the present assizes, and a writ was ordered to be received by the Clerk of the Crown. Mr. Blackburne, Mr. Malley, and Mr. Sampson, appeared as his counsel.

On Tuesday, Mr. Levery was tried on the charge of a soldier belonging to the South Down Militia, (named Sullivan) of attempting to induce him to take an oath "to be true to the King of York and his Committees." The transaction happened in a public house, and several witnesses were called to shew it could not have taken place without their knowledge.—He was found guilty.

John Devenin, was the same day indicted for the murder of his wife, by discharging a gun near her face. The fact of his having shot her was early proved—and also that he absconded.—The defence set up was, that he was subject to temporary insanity, and that it was in a fit of madness he had perpetrated the horrid deed. It so appears that a violent dispute had taken place between him and his wife, and there was no evidence of cool and deliberate malice. The Judge said the Jury were to consider whether the man at the time of committing the fact was deprived of his senses, in which case, as he had no will, he could commit no crime, or whether it was a sudden act of passion, without malice, and in consequence of violent provocation—in which case they might find him guilty of manslaughter; but if they thought it was wilful, and implied malice, they should find him guilty of murder. The Jury said at a considerable time, and brought in a verdict "not guilty of murder, but guilty of manslaughter." Mr. Ewing was Counsel for the prosecution, and Mr. Malley for the prisoner.

**Cork, April 2.** Nine Indictments for murder have been found at this Assizes, by the County Grand Jury!

Yesterday a man was found guilty of murder, in the county Court, and is to be executed, we hear, on Monday.

Some very serious dissensions prevail among the privates of the Dublin Militia and those of O'Connell's Brigade, both quartered at Kinsale; one of the former lost his life a few days ago, in consequence of having a finger cut off by one of the latter.

By a letter from Martinique, dated 30th of January, we find that General Abercrombie, was then prepared to attack St. Lucia. It is said that the most horrid massacres had been committed in Grenada and St. Vincent's by the Insurgents, and that when caught, they were retaliated on.—These two islands have lost property to the amount of five millions sterl.—After the affair of the 9th at St. Vincent's, the enemy advanced to the capital, Kingston, and bombarded it.—On the 20th General Hunter intended an attack, but was anticipated by the enemy, who commenced the action, which lasted from four in the morning till seven at night.—The French and Caribs retired with the loss of 4000 men; the English had 60 killed and wounded on this occasion.

John Fitz-gerald submitted to an indictment for an assault on Margaret Coneen—fined one mark, and bound to keep the peace for 7 years, especially to Mary and Margaret Coneen.
