The Active from St. Ubes was taken in the River Kenmare, the people all left the ship before the privateer got within gun shot of them.

The Captain of the privateer gave the long boat of the Integrity to fome of the men who landed in the river Kenmare, part of them were on board me this morning—an affidavit of the above has been made on board me this day.—Sworn before Edward Thomas Orpin Ffq; a Magistrate of this county. Two other vessels, name unknown.

An account of the above was fent to Admiral Kingfmill, who difpatched a frigate in quest of the Frenchman.

LONDON,—April 11.

We have to communicate to our readers that the hopes which were formed of a speedy Peace being concluded, has vanished: On the 8th ult. Mr. Wickham, our minister to the Swiss cantons, transmitted a Note to Mr. Barthelemi, to which the Directory returned for answer, that they will either make nor listen to any proposal contrary to the laws of France.—In consequence of which the following official notice has this day appeared.

The Court of London has received from its Minister in Switzerland, the answer made to the questions which he had been charged to address to Monsieur Barthelemi, in respect to the opening of a Negotiation for the re-establishment of general tranquillity.

This Court has feen, with regret, how far the tone and spirit of that answer, the nature and extent of the demands which it contains, and the manner of announcing them, are remote from

any disposition for Peace.

The inadmillible pretention is there allowed of appropriating to France all that the laws actually existing there may have comprised under the denomination of French territory. To a demand such as this is added an express declaration, that no proposal contrary to it will be made, or even listened to: and this, under the pretence of an internal regulation, the provisions of which are wholly foreign to all other nations.

While these dispositions shall be persisted in, nothing is left for the King but to prosecute a

war equally just and necessary.

Whenever his enemies shall manifest more pacific sentiments, his Majesty will at all times be eager to concur in them, by lending himself, in concert with his Allies, to all such measures as shall be best calculated to re-establish general tranquility on conditions just, honourable and permanent: either by the establishment of a Congress, which has been so often and so happily the means of restoring Peace to Europe; or by a preliminary discussion of the principles which may be proposed, on either side, as a foundation of a general pacification; or, lastly by an impartial examination of any other way which may be

to proceed for London, was towed up to Capt. Hill's quay;—the cargo has been put on board vessels fent for that purpose from London.

Capt. Phelan, of the brig St. Anthony, of Dublin, is just arrived here, after being captured on the 8th inft. by a French privateer called the Frontisie, of Brest, Capt. Leptaw, in latitude 50. 30. long. 9. 30. the privateer also captured the Hope, Jameson, of Dumbarton; the Integrity, Steel, of Workington; the faid veffels were all loaded with provisions at Limerick, and bound for London, the masters and crews were put on show in the Sound of the Dorseys, and the vessels were fent to France.—Said privateer also fell in with the Brothers, bound from Limerick to London, with provisions, the Captain of which vessel having hoifted Hambro' colours, escaped. - Capt. Phelan also reports, that said privateer took a veffel bound from England to Newfoundland; and also a vessel loaded with talt, for Cork, was purfued by the privateer into Kenmare river, and taken.
