End of the DUBLIN GAZETTE.

The secrecy observed by the Dutch in their naval expeditions is productive of the most beneficial consequences to them. The destination of the fleet which lately sailed from the Texel is not known, even at the present moment, to any person but the executive officers; by which conduct they have completely frustrated the attempts on our part to intercept them.

The present exertions of the Dutch to create a fleet, must bring to recollection the naval efforts of that people in the last century, at the commencement of which they defeated the Spaniards and Portuguese in the East, as also defeated the Spaniards on the coast of South America, and made some settlements there. Afterwards they proved a match on the watery element for England and France, and became the carriers of the other maritime powers of Europe. During the present century they suffered their fleets to decay, and as far as appearances go, notwithstanding something like an endeavour for that purpose, will probably not equip a marine of great force in aid of their new allies.

This day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant will lay the first stone of the additional buildings to the Royal College of St. Patrick, at Maynooth, in the co. of Kildare. These buildings are to occupy a space of 400 feet in front, and are intended to contain apartments for 200 students.

A few days ago 720 stands of arms, and six field pieces, 12 pounders, brads mounted, were entered at the Custom House, by the Board of Ordnance.

Yesterday an inquest was held on the body of Thomas Whitehouse, at his late residence in James's-street, who brought in a verdict of *felo de se*.—His remains were found suspended from the balusters, where they were supposed to have hung for upwards of a month, and consequently in a dreadful state of decay and putrefaction. It seems he had discharged his female attendant under pretext of retiring to Powerscourt, in the county of Wicklow, and shut up his shop with this avowed intention. A considerable time having elapsed without any information being received by his landlord or other interested persons, the doors were forced, and the wretched man discovered in his shirt, his night-cap over his face, in the above lamentable circumstance.

The above wretched person, with his brother Joshua, (who died suddenly about a twelvemonth ago) several years since, and before Lotteries were resorted to for national purposes, had been employed as agents in the sale of tickets issued
