official declaration precludes even the

ligerent Powers. If hostilities have not yet been
renewed on the banks of the Rhine, there are
good grounds for believing that the suspension is
not imputable to a pending negotiation so much
as to an understanding between the armies who
required a short interval for the collection of pro-
visions, &c.

ENGLAND.

PLYMOUTH-DOCK, April 28. Arrived from

LONDON,—April 29 & 30.

Major General Sir A. Williamson, K. B. was
this day presented to the King, on his arrival
from St. Domingo; and afterwards had a closet
audience of his Majesty.

A Paris paper of the 26th instant has been re-
ceived. The only intelligence of importance
which it contains, is a confirmation of the second
signal victory gained by the French over the
Austrians in Italy.

There was a report circulated last night of
the French having taken possession of Genoa.—
We do not believe that any intelligence, of such
an event having occurred, has been received;
but that the French can and that they will make
themselves masters of Genoa we have every rea-
son to believe.

There has been a very considerable failure at
Hamburgh, which, it is said, will be attended
with many other failures.

The first of the late battles in Italy appears to
have been fought within a few hours march of
Savona, a sea port town, no more than twenty
miles to the north west of Genoa: and Monte
Lezimo is a mountain of that chain of Appenines,
which separate the narrow territory of the Ge-
noese from the western part of Piedmont. Sa-
fello is beyond the mountains, and there is a di-
rect road from it into the heart of Piedmont, and
the open neighbourhood of the Milanese. The
defences of Turin, of which the fortrefs of Su-
za is the chief, are to the northward of the city;
the French are now to the south-west of it.

General Buonaparte, who commands at present
the Republican army in Italy, is about thirty
years of age. Under the ancient regimen, he
was an officer of artillery, and enjoyed the re-
putation of being a man of talents. He is a na-
tive of Corsica, and son to the chieftain Govern-
or of Calvi, in that Island.

The Senate of Venice, acceding at length to
the desires of the French Government, has or-
dered Louis XVIII. to retire immediately from
the territories of the Venetian Republic.

A Letter dated Carlisle Bay, 9th March, from

half of Admiral Christian's fleet is arrived; that
