6.]—We received this morning, by express, Paris papers from the 25th ult. to the 4th inst. They contain not only a confirmation of the two victories gained by the French in Italy, but also accounts of fresh advantages and fresh victories.

The account in the Paris Paper, of the 25th ult. of the second victory gained by the French was not exaggerated. General Buonaparte, in his official letter, says, that the Austrians lost between 2000 and 2,500 killed, and nearly 900 prisoners, besides 22 pieces of cannon. The day after the second victory Gen. Beaulieu, with a chosen body of troops, surprized the town of Dego, and gained advantages over the French early in the day, which were lost in the afternoon.

The Piedmontese Army has evacuated the entrenched Camp at Ceva, as well as the Town itself, of which the French took possession. They have likewise taken Mondovi.

The Dutch fleet, according to the Paris papers, is gone North about to the Cape.

Sir S. Smith is confined in the Abbaye at Paris. The Kite sloop, of 18 guns, has captured a Dutch cutter of 12 guns, and a French privateer of 10 guns, off the Naze of Norway, and is arrived at the Nore.

### DUBLIN,—MAY 9.

During the reign of Charles VIII. that Monarch, in five months, traversed affrighted Italy as a conqueror, gave laws to the Florentines and the Pope, was acknowledged King of Naples, and assumed the title of the Emperor of the East. Charles having lost all his conquests, died soon afterwards; leaving his kingdom exhausted by the consequences of his rash ambition.
