

Monday the Bill for relief of the Quakers, passed both Houses of Parliament in England.

Letters were yesterday received in town from Barbadoes, dated so late as the 10th of April: The fleet of transports, which sailed from Cork on the 24th of February last, arrived safe at Barbadoes the 30th of March.—General Abercrombie, immediately after his arrival, ordered four thousand men to reduce St. Domingo, and made such other disposition of the troops under his command as, according to the opinion of the writers of these letters, cannot fail to deprive the enemy (who has not been able to send out any augmentation) of every Island in the West-Indies.—The returns made to the General of the number of troops arrived at Barbadoes in the last month, were fourteen thousand seven hundred and thirty-four rank and file.

Letters from Turin advise, that when the account of a second defeat had been experienced by the allied armies in Piedmont, reached that capital, an almost general insurrection of the lower class of the inhabitants took place, of a complexion that threatened the very existence of the government, martial law was proclaimed, nor was the commotion assuaged, although the rioters were fired on and many lives lost, until a promise, on the part of the distressed Monarch, was made the people, that a pacific negotiation would immediately be entered into with the French Republic, that should put an end to the war.

The object of Mr. Pelham's visit to England is to resume his seat in the House of Commons.

Yesterday commenced the Examination for two Fellows of Trinity College, in the room of Mr. Ward, deceased; and Dr. Burrowes, resigned. The Candidates, Messrs. Cotter, Lloyd, Nash, Scott, Cuile and Rea, were examined, from eight till ten o'clock, in Logicks, by Dr. Barrett, and from two till four o'clock in Mathematics, by Dr. Elrington.

Cork, May 16. Three frigates and the Hazard sloop of war, are now unmooring, and sail next tide on a cruize; the Diana has made the signal for convoy to the channel, and will sail as soon as the vessels are collected.

Extract of a letter from Admiral Kingsmill, to Mr. Lyons, of this City, dated Cove, May 18, 1796.

"I have received your letter of the 16th inst. concerning the vessels loading at your port—I shall send the Viper sloop of war to Carigahole Bay, to wait for and take them under convoy to this place, from whence they shall be sent to England under a stronger convoy by the earliest opportunity. But in regard to the Trade which is now ready to sail from the Shannon, I wish you would make known to the concerned, that those which are bound this way, may proceed immediately in full security, there being a Squadron stationed to cruize between Cape Clear and the Blasquets, for the protection of the Coasting Trade, and one of that Squadron, a shipped, rigged sloop of war, will constantly keep near the Coast."
