

There are in circulation rumours of disagreements between a distinguished Personage and his wife. It is said that these disagreements have risen to such a height, that for nearly three weeks all converse has ceased between the parties.

Sunday evening was buried at St. Saviour's-Church Southwark, John Moseley, hat-dyer, of Queen-street, Borough: he was attended by a great number of his acquaintances, who much lament his loss. He was killed on Whitfun Monday evening, between the hour of ten and eleven, in a fray opposite the Philanthropic Society, by a man who stabbed him with a tuck in the eye, concealed within a stick, which entered two inches in his brain, and he never spoke afterwards. The man ran off, as soon as he had committed the horrid crime, towards the Obelisk.

A subject of great importance to the commercial world is likely soon to find its way into the Court of King's Bench. The silks on board the Mediterranean fleet, captured last winter by Admiral Richery, and carried into Cadiz, were pretended to be, or were bought up by a Spanish company, at the head of which was the Marquis d'Iranda.—These silks have never been regularly condemned as a lawful prize, and have moreover been shipped for London, contrary to the statutes of the act of navigation.

A ship, laden with some of these silks, and valued at 120,000l. sterling, is arrived in the river from Cadiz, to the address of a principal commercial house in Old Broad-street. The Underwriters, who have formerly paid losses on these very silks, have petitioned to have the goods on board this ship stopped, which application the Court of Admiralty has complied with. The attachment, after been taken off, has been again renewed.

DUBLIN,—May 30.

A most profitable speculation to the merchant, at present, would be the importation of linen rags, especially from Hamburg, from whence little has been yet imported into this kingdom, though the expences are much less in time of war than from the ports of the Mediterranean. This article as we are credibly informed, has risen within these few months sixty per cent, in consequence of the increased demand for the supply of the many new paper-works lately erected in the vicinity of this city.

England, it is computed, depends for not less than one-third of its consumption of this material on foreign countries.

A vulgar error prevailed some years ago in this kingdom, that our climate, from its moisture, was unfit for the production of corn in any quantity to answer the consumption of the inhabitants; and it was a common saying, that Ireland would never produce bread enough for Sundays. This error is dissipated by the demonstration of fact, whereby it appears that Ireland not only grows corn for its own consumption, but a considerable quantity for exportation. Another error in the agricultural line has kept its ground to this day that hops would never be reared to answer the purpose of brewing here. The contrary has just appeared unquestionably; for we find that four of our brewers, namely, Messrs. Sherlock, Alley, Hicks, and Maitland, were, on the 19th of this month, adjudged the sum of 150l. as premiums, for brewing 3000 barrels of beer, from Irish hops, of the growths of the years 1794 and 1795.
