

and we of course took possession of her. The twenty-gun ship made off, but I trust the Unicorn has taken the other frigate, as we left her close in chace, but not quite up with her opponent at the time we lost sight of them.—Our loss in killed and wounded is very trifling indeed, when it is considered the number of broadsides we received, not only from the frigate taken, but those also fired at us by the other,—we had only two men killed, and our Boatswain and one seaman wounded; the Thames had 41 killed, and 11 wounded.

“ Captain Martin having put Mr. Harrison, First Lieutenant, and myself, in charge of the prize, we arrived here last night, in company with the Santa Margareta.”

Two large vessels, supposed to be the Unicorn and her prize, were seen off Tramore on Sunday. The prize had her main-mast cut away.

A heavy firing at sea was heard early last Monday morning by the inhabitants of Tramore, Waterford.

A Letter from a Gentleman at Cove, (to Waterford) dated June 9, says:—“ This morning arrived here Lieutenant Carpenter, of his Majesty's ship Unicorn, with a large ship from Surinam (her prize) valued at 40,000l. which she took off Scilly: when Lieut. Carpenter left the Unicorn, she was in chace of three ships which had the appearance of a French privateer brig, and two prizes.”

The Rev. Dr. Coke has interested himself in behalf of a very important Charity—the Missions which have been established for the conversion and civilization of the Heathens. Twenty-three thousand of them have been already brought to the knowledge of Christianity, and to all the relative duties of Life; besides many thousands of Catechumens, who are also in a promising way of becoming ornaments of the Christian religion. Upwards of nine thousand of the Negroes in Jamaica, Barbadoes, and the other Islands of the West Indies, have embraced the doctrines and principles of Christianity, and are examples of morality in their lives and conversation, through the labours of the Missionaries, under the Grace and Providence of God.—Missions have also been established at Sierra Leone, on the Coast of Guinea, where 400 of the Blacks have been already converted, and brought to a considerable degree of civilization. The King of the Foulahs, in the Interior of Africa, who is a Mahometan, and whose Capital is about 300 miles from the Coast of Guinea, has, through the medium of the Sierra Leone Company, invited Missionaries for the benefit of his People; and six Missionaries, five of whom are married, and one single, have been accordingly sent to his dominions.

But the expence of these Missions is very great. An annual Subscription has for years been established for the support of this great work; but the Expenditures have far exceeded the annual Subscription. An occasional application, therefore, is now made to the generous and humane in behalf of this important establishment.—Many Gentlemen and Ladies of the City of Limerick, have already contributed largely to this great Charity; and any further Subscriptions will be received at the Bank of Messrs.
