The following instances of the precarious tenure by which we hold this mortal life, lately occurred at Llanarmon, near Oswestry:—The Rev. Mr. Williams, Vicar of that parish, died very suddenly, and his brother, the Curate of Llanfilin, having been sent for on the occasion, dropped down dead, soon after entering the house. The widow also of the deceased Vicar expired last week, after a very few hours illness.

The Duke of Leeds has sold his estate of Kingston-upon-Soar, to Mr. Arkwright, for 39,000l. Died. On Monday last, deservedly lamented, Mrs. Denham Forde.

LIMERICK,—JUNE 15.

Extract of a letter from Lieutenant Keenan, of His Majesty's ship Santa Margareta, to his Friend in this City, dated at Cove the 12th Instant, on board the French frigate Thames.

"You will hear with as much pleasure as I have in acquainting you, that on the 8th inst. in company with H. M. frigate Unicorn, about 30 leagues off Scilly, at 10 o'clock in the morning, we found ourselves within one mile of two French frigates and a twenty-gun ship; we immediately went to quarters, and steered for them, though much superior to us, but on our attempting to close with them, they made off: however, after exchanging several chace guns and broadsides, the Santa Margareta was fortunately enabled to get close along-side the Thames French frigate, (formerly in our service) at 4 o'clock in the evening, in which situation she engaged us for only a short half hour, when she struck her colours, and we of course took possession of her. The twenty-gun ship made off, but I trust the Unicorn has taken the other frigate, as we left her close in chace, but not quite up with her opponent at the time we lost sight of them.—Our loss in killed and wounded is very trifling indeed, when it is considered the number of broadsides we received, not only from the frigate taken, but those also fired at us by the other,—we had only two men killed, and our Boatswain and one seaman wounded; the Thames had 41 killed, and 11 wounded.

Captain Martin having put Mr. Harrison, First Lieutenant, and myself, in charge of the prize, we arrived here last night, in company with the Santa Margareta."

Two large vessels, supposed to be the Unicorn and her prize, were seen off Tramore on Sunday. The prize had her main-mast cut away.

A heavy firing at sea was heard early last Monday morning by the inhabitants of Tramore, Waterford.

A Letter from a Gentleman at Cove, (to Waterford) dated June 9, says:—"This morning arrived here Lieutenant Carpenter, of his Majesty's ship Unicorn, with a large ship from Surinam (her prize) valued at 40,000l. which she took off Scilly: when Lieut. Carpenter left the Unicorn, she was in chace of three ships which had the appearance of a French privateer brig, and two prizes."

...from Glasgow, June 9. "Yesterday morning arrived in the Clyde, the Jason, Dutch frigate, of 36 guns, and 201 men, G. Donckum, commander.—On the 31st of March last, when 50 leagues to the westward of Broadhaven, in Ireland, he fell in with the Mary Ann, of this port, from Nevis, which he captured and sunk, after taking out some rum, &c. Capt. Donckum then beat about by contrary winds in the same lat. till the 4th inst. where his crew, disaffected with the new order of things in their own country, or for other reasons, mutinied, confined Capt. Donckum and his principal Officers, put the frigate under the conduct of Capt. Crawford, of the Mary-Anne, and ordered him to pilot her into the first British port, with an intention, it is said, of delivering up the vessel to Government. On her arrival in the Road, the mutineers hoisted the British over the Dutch flag, and fired a Royal salute; they then brought their Officers on shore, and have since assisted in removing their ammunition and warlike stores on board of one of his Majesty's cutters. The Capt. and those attached to him are put into a place of security.

"The Jason was part of a fleet of 17 sail, five of which are of the line, and 12 of which were bound to the East Indies, under the command of Rear Admiral Lucas, the remainder to Surinam."

It is confidently asserted, that it has been determined on raising several new regiments, both of the Line and of Fencibles in this Kingdom; among others spoken of, Major McDonald, of the Perthshire Highland Fencibles, has received letters of service for raising a Regiment of Infantry.
