CORK, JUNE 13.

Cove, June 9, 1796.

On Tuesday last, arrived his Majesty's ship Dryad, Lord Beauclerk, from a cruize; on Saturday the Dryad fell in with the Viper sloop, Captain Teeffin, who sailed from here some days ago for the River Shannon; off Mizen Head, he fell in with a French brig, of 16 guns, which he immediately gave chase to, and run her in 34 hours from Mizen-Head close into Ushant, at which time the Viper by carrying a press of sail, carried away her main-top-mast, by which the Frenchman escaped.—The Dryad sailed this morning again on a cruize.

June 12.

We have the satisfaction to state, that yesterday evening arrived here, his Majesty's ship Santa Margareta, T. B. Martin, Esq; Commander, with the French frigate L'Tamise, formerly Thames English frigate, captured on Wednesday last off the Saltees. The Unicorn, Captain Williams, and Santa Margareta, were cruising on their station between Scilly and the Head of Kinsale; on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, saw three sail of ships, which were soon discovered to be French frigates, one L'Tribune of 40 guns and 330 men, commanded by Monsieur Moulton, Commodore; L'Tamise, 36 guns and 310 men, and a smaller ship of 24 guns.

Captain Williams on seeing their force, spoke the Margareta, and told Capt. Martin it would be a glorious day, that they would have an opportunity of serving their country, and doing honor to themselves, on which the two ships cheered each other and made sail, Captain Williams to the largest and Captain Martin to the Thames; the Frenchmen shewed no disposition to engage, but made all the sail they could; by 11 o'clock, the Margareta was up with the Thames, so as to begin a running fight, as was the Unicorn with Tribune, continued engaging in that way, till 4 o'clock: the Thames not failing near so fast as Tribune, gave Captain Martin an opportunity of bringing her to close action, and he gave her such a well directed fire, that in about 30 minutes she struck, having 33 men killed and 35 wounded.—We are happy to say the Margareta lost but two men killed and three wounded, the smaller one run away on seeing her consorts attacked.

Arrived this morning and sailed immediately, his Majesty's sloop Trompeuse, Captain Watson. We understand the Margareta sails again on a cruize immediately after the prisoners are shifted.

The Thames carries 30 guns, 12 pounders, and 4 two pound caronades, 310 men.—Margareta 36 guns, 12 pounders, 250 men.

Extract of a Letter from a Passenger on board the Beaufoy, dated Carlisle-Bay, Barbadoes, April 28.

“With heartfelt pleasure I acquaint you of our safe arrival here, after a pleasant passage of 39 days from Cork; When we had got to the latitude of 23, and long. 30, we discovered one morning at day light, 7 large ships; our Commodore hoisted a signal for the fleet to disperse, as he suspected they were

The Unicorn frigate, of 32 guns, Captain Williams, has brought into Cove the La Tribune French frigate, of 40 guns, after an engagement of half an hour, in which the latter had 24 men killed, and 30 wounded—the Unicorn had not a single man killed.

On the 14th inst. the Santa Margareta, Capt. Martin, proceeded from Cove for Greenock, to take charge of the Jason Dutch frigate, brought into that port, as mentioned in our last.

Early on Thursday last, Mr. Pat. Hennessy, Cabinet-maker, of George's-quay, was found drowned in the river nearly opposite his dwelling house. From several circumstances, and having some marks of violence, doubts arose that he had been thrown off the quay.—The verdict of the Coroner's inquest was, however,—“Accidental Death.”

Thursday last, by order of the Lax-weir Fishery Company, nine Fishing Cots, which had been seized for unlawfully fishing on their property, were burned at the Salmon-weir.

The Rev. Dr. Coke has interested himself in behalf of a very important Charity—the Missions which have been established for the conversion and civilization of the Heathens. Twenty-three thousand of them have been already brought to the knowledge of Christianity, and to all the relative duties of Life; besides many thousands of Catechumens, who are also in a promising way of becoming ornaments of the Christian religion. Upwards of nine thousand of the Negroes in Jamaica, Barbadoes, and the other Islands of the West Indies, have embraced the doctrines and principles of Christianity, and are examples of morality in their lives and conversation, through the labours of the Missionaries, under the Grace and Providence of God.—Missions have also been established at Sierra Leone, on the Coast of Guinea, where 400 of the Blacks have been already converted, and brought to a considerable degree of civilization. The King of the Foulahs, in the Interior of Africa, who is a Mahometan, and whose Capital is about 300 miles from the Coast of Guinea, has, through the medium of the Sierra Leone Company, invited Missionaries for the benefit of his People; and six Missionaries, five of whom are married, and one single, have been accordingly sent to his dominions.

But the expence of these Missions is very great. An annual Subscription has for years been established for the support of this great work; but the Expenditures have far exceeded the annual Subscription.
