Extract of a Letter from New-York, to Mr. H. B. of this City, dated May 14, 1796.

“House Rent is extravagantly high in this City, the rent we paid in 1793 was 40l. a year, for which we now pay 80l. this is on account of the vast immigrations from Europe; several hundred families arriving every month, in so much that although 2000 houses were finished in this City last year, yet house rent is still rapidly increasing; and provisions are in proportion: fine flour we paid 39 shillings a barrel for in 1793, we now pay 104 shillings for; beef, mutton, and veal, from 12d. to 16d. a pound currency, that is from 8d. to 12d. sterling; butter from 2s. 6d. to 3s. currency, that is from 2s. to 2s. 6d. sterling; vegetables are exceeding high, I have seen 2s. for a large head of cabbage, and 2s. worth of parsnips would fit in your coat pocket;—Our last Winter was very mild, and our Spring has hitherto been very cool, which causes health to abound.—Business of every kind is very brisk, and we have seldom less than from 500 to 800 shipping in our quays and harbour.”

The Union, Petrie; the Agnes, Campbell; the Janet, McLachlin; and the Brothers, Morris; all from this Port, with Oats, arrived at Glasgow the 15th inst.—and on same day the Elizabeth, Blair, with tobacco, and glass, and the Eleanor, with coals, for this Port, cleared out of Glasgow.

**DIED.** On Sunday last, at his House in Mungret-street, in his 74th year, as universally as he is most deservedly lamented, The Right Rev. Dr. Denis Conway, Roman Catholic Bishop of this Diocese; in him were united the real gentleman, as well as man of extensive erudition; his sweetness of temper, and gentleness of manners, were so intimately united to unbounded generosity and genuine hospitality, that it was difficult to determine which of these virtues formed the most conspicuous trait in his character.—His remains were yesterday interred in the Vault of St. John's Church, usually appropriated for the Roman Catholic Bishops of this Diocese, attended by all the Clergy, and a vast number of afflicted relatives and friends:—He is succeeded by the Right Reverend Dr. John Young, some time since consecrated as the Co-adjutor of Bishop Conway.

**T**HE Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties, directed the following Sections of the Act, passed in the last Session, to be published for the information of the Public.  
 Section LI. “And be it enacted, that for which any Receipt shall be given, shall be expressed in such Receipt; and all Persons who accept any Receipt in which a less Sum than the Sum actually received, with an addition of the Duties, or shall divide the Sum into several Receipts, or shall, by any general Act or Use of the Word “settled” or such like, endeavour to evade the Duties, or be guilty of any fraudulent Contrivance, to defraud of any of the Duties on Receipts, such Person giving or accepting such Receipts or giving or receiving a less Sum than is expressed in such Receipt, shall forfeit Twentieth Part thereof to be paid to the Informer for the same, and the other to his Majesty.”  
 LIV. “And be it enacted, That all unfranked Receipts, not amounting to Ten Pounds, and which are not in full of all Demands, shall be given as a general Acknowledgment of all Debts being discharged, may be given in Evidence available in law for such Sum so expressed in such Receipt, shall forfeit Twentieth Part thereof to be paid to the Informer for the same, and the other to his Majesty.”  
 LV. “And be it enacted, That all Receipts with a Stamp of Two-pence, in which any Sum shall be expressed, and which shall, by the Use of the Words “in full of all Demands,” or otherwise, be given as a general Acknowledgment of all Debts being discharged, may be given in Evidence, and may be received for such Sum so expressed, but not as a general Acknowledgment of all Debts being discharged.”  
 LVII. “Provided always, That all Receipts for Rent shall be paid by the Person receiving such Rents.”  
 LVIII. “And provided also, That every Person giving such Receipts, who shall, upon Demand, a Receipt for the same, shall forfeit the Sum so expressed, one Moiety thereof to the Informer for the same, and the other Moiety to his Majesty.”
