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their soldiers, "that they had all taken up arms
 for the purpose of re-establishing Religion and
 Monarchy; that they had exerted their utmost
 efforts to attain this end; that all their exertions
 had been baffled by contrary events, and that a
 longer resistance could serve no other purpose
 but that of prolonging assassinations, burnings,
 and plunder, without the least hope of obtaining
 their end, they thought it their duty to exhort
 them to put a period to all hostilities, to with-
 draw in peace to their families and enjoy their
 property; while for their own part, as their
 principles remained still the same, and they
 found it impossible to ensure them success, they
 would not prolong the horrors of a civil war,
 but retire into a foreign country." The Chouan
 army, obedient to the exhortations of its Chiefs,
 dispersed immediately, and tranquillity is now
 restored on both banks of the Loire, as well as
 in Anjou.

The unfortunate Henry Weston, who was ex-
 ecuted on Wednesday last, was attended in the
 morning by three Reverend Divines, who con-
 ducted him to chapel, in order that he might re-
 ceive the sacrament with his fellow-sufferer, who
 particularly expressed how happy he should be
 if Mr. Weston would grant him the favour; "if
 not, (said he) I hope nevertheless we may meet
 in Heaven;" for it must be observed that Weston
 did not usually come to chapel, not being there
 above three or four times during his confinement,
 having been waited upon by some clergyman or
 other in his own room. However, on the morn-
 ing of his execution, he attended and communi-
 cated with the Reverend Gentlemen and his fel-
 low Convict; the sacrament was administered by
 the Ordinary, who afterwards prayed with the
 unhappy prisoners on the scaffold, attended by
 one of the Divines alone, as the other two could
 not make up their minds to go on the platform,
 though requested by the unhappy young Weston.
 Upon the executioner's putting on the cap, he
 pulled it as far as he possibly could himself over
 his face, and at the same time held a white hand-
 kerchief to his mouth, so that during prayers,
 the populace could by no means see his counte-
 nance. He wept abundantly just before he was
 turned off, and squeezed his friend, (the Minis-
 ter's hand,) being no doubt much agitated.

The day before he died, he and one of the
 Clergymen expressed a wish that he might not
 be kept long at the place of execution, and that
 Colin Recoist, the other malefactor, might be
 informed of it, hoping that he would be ready
 and willing to comply with the desire; but in
 this they were mistaken, for he, an old inmate
 of Newgate, was not at all ashamed of appear-
 ing in public; therefore, when he was informed
 of it, he replied, "What, is Weston afraid of
 being seen? that is not my case, I am not only
 willing for the people to see me, but likewise to
 tell them to take warning by my untimely end;
 therefore, (says he to the Ordinary) let me have
 the usual prayers;" to which he was answered,
 he had an undoubted right, and that his petition
 should certainly be granted.
