

...to bring off from Lisbon their stock of wine and other goods deposited there; and whether permission would be granted them to import, land, and put into the King's Warehouses in this emergency their stocks of wines without paying the duties required by law? Such were the important questions which the Committee were appointed to put to Mr. Pitt. What his answers were we have not heard.

The Experiment, Norton, from Virginia, with flour; also the George, Rust, from Bourdeaux, with a cargo of American flour, which would not sell at that place in consequence of the large supplies they are constantly receiving, are arrived at Bristol. The master of the George declares, that all kinds of provisions are remarkably plentiful and cheap at Bourdeaux, and that fresh butter is sold for 3½d. per pound.

On Wednesday morning arrived at Plymouth, the Danish schooner Experiment, of and for Christiansand, Thomas Peterson master, from St. Martins, in the Isle of Rhee, laden with brandy and salt, detained last Monday, about 12 leagues N. N. E. of Ushant, by his Majesty's ship Suffisant, of 14 guns, Captain Tomlinson. Last Friday, the Suffisant being cruising on the coast of France, fell in with a small fleet of coasters, but the weather being very foggy, and the fleet very near the shore, several of them escaped, by running betwixt some rocks and the land: the remainder about 8 sail in number, were driven ashore, which the Suffisant's boat attempted to get off, or destroy, but were prevented from effecting either, by the fire from two batteries on the shore, of four guns each; had the fog cleared up an hour or two earlier, Captain Tomlinson would have captured the whole fleet.

They were convoyed by a brig and 2 cutters, who instead of protecting the convoy, made off. In the course of the day the Suffisante fell in with the Squadron under the command of Sir John Warren, but too late to effect any thing.

At Stafford Assizes on Thursday last, William Cotterell was indicted for burglariously robbing the house of Mr. Ferman, of Answorth: he pleaded guilty, nor could he, for a long time, be persuaded to do otherwise, and indeed he would not put himself on his trial, until the Judge had threatened, if he did not, to leave him for execution. The evidence adduced was not sufficient to convict him, and he was of course, most unexpectedly, acquitted.

Thursday 28 prisoners transmitted from the country for transportation, were lodged in the new Gaol. They had all been under sentence of death for Defenderism, and plundering houses of arms, but were pardoned for transportation through the humanity of Government.

DIED. In London, on the 2d instant, Capt. Richard North, late of the Roscommon militia.

Cork, August 6. Among the many improvements, by which machinery has multiplied and multiplied our manufactures, none is more deserving of public attention, than that lately made in the spinning wheel by Mr. Sheares.—By the addition of a second spool judiciously situated, that machine now gives occupation to both hands at once, and the spinner is enabled to spin

On Wednesday, Michael, John, and Thomas Long, and William Swaton, were tried in the county court, on a charge of having plundered the brig Lady Harrist, stranded near Skull, on the 29th of December, 1794, and acquitted, the charges having appeared unfounded.

On Thursday, four brothers of the name of Kidney, were tried before Baron George, for the murder of one Connor at the Fair of Buttravent, some time back.—Three of the brothers were found guilty of manslaughter and the fourth of the murder, and condemned to die this day. The fate of this unfortunate family, should be a warning to those, who disturb the peace of society at fairs, and wantonly shed innocent blood.

Last week and yesterday Mr. Kiedy, Inspector, seized three large casks of Butter, for being lined on the inside with grease, mixed with a large quantity of salt; which were condemned agreeable to law, by order of George Vincent, Esq; weigh-master.
