Yesterday exhibited a most superb scene at Le-

oldest corps. The noble Earl was pleased to ex-
press his approbation of the military adroitness
exhibited by the whole of the troops:—the fine-
ness of the day in no small degree favoured this
elegant spectacle.

After the Review, Lord Moira, the Duke of
Leinster, Lord Granard, Lord Clements, and all
the Staff Officers, were most elegantly entertained
at dinner by General Crosbie.

In the evening the second Camp Ball was most
numerously and brilliantly attended by the noble
guests of General Crosbie, and all the people of
fashion in the neighbourhood.

The Ball commenced between 8 and 9 o'clock,
and at one Supper was announced, at which up-
wards of 200 persons sat down—after which the
dance was resumed, which did not close till five
o'clock this morning.

Orders, we hear, are given to change the in-
land quarters of the army of this kingdom to
cantonments nearer the sea coast; and notice it
is said, has been signified to the several county
Governors, to consider of the best mode of inter-
nal defence and security of the peace, in the ab-
sence of the troops.

An officer of justice has arrived from London

in London, to the injury of his employer, Mr.

Bray, and had 120 guineas per annum.
