Last Saturday, William Green, Esq; third son to the late Francis Green, of Graige, County of Limerick, Esq; swimming in the river near Ennis Mills, was suddenly seized with cramps, and we are concerned to add, unfortunately perished;—he was in the 19th year of his age, possessed of the most endearing qualities, which render his death truly afflicting to his numerous and respectable family and acquaintance.
