.... to ourserves, and we shall alone be equal to the contest-but let us not follow the cowardly advice of our internal enemies, and fubmit to a base peace, which must, worse than the most destructive war, put an end at once to the honour, the freedom, and independence of Great Britain.

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The vigorous measures adopted by the Court of Portugal for placing that country in the most respectable state of defence, are well worthy of its administration. By fo doing, the Portuguese Government will be enabled either to negociate with honor, or defend itself with energy.

This conduct on the part of one of the most inferior powers of the Coalition, at a time when it has been deferted by almost oll the others, do infinite credit to the Government which adopts tin; and is well calculated to revive in British Joms their ancient fentiments for the Portuguese, our constant and faithful Allies. At the fame rime, thefe measures must make other powers regret, that from want of a timely vigorous exertion, they have fuffered themselves to be treated like flaves by their haughty and unprincipled conquerors.

A letter brought by the Corunna Mail ascribes the delay of the Spanish Fleet to the burricane months in the West Indies.

The accounts of the defeat fultained by the Austrians near Castiglione, received by the Imperial Minister, by no means admit of the loss being fo great as mentioned in the French details. In the previous actions the rout of the French is stated to have been fo apparently complete, that they were not supposed capable of returning to the charge. In this, however, the Imperialitts were fatally mistaken; such reinforcements came up as to double, in two days, the number at first brought into the field.

This was accomplished by concentring almost the whole of the French force, including the greater part of the besieging army from Mantua.

Baron Jacobi, the Prussian Envoy, it is said, is on the point of embarking for the Continent, for the purpose of a personal interview with his Sovereign; faid to be on bufiness proposed from the British Cabinet.

DUBLIN,-AUGUST 25.

It was on Friday last reported in London, that orders had been fent to Mr. Hammond, at Hamburg, to fuspend, until further instruction, the bufiness of his mission; the fudden and very extraordinary decisions of the Imperial Diet at Ratisbon having deranged the ground upon which the proposed negociation was to be conftructed.

On the same day it was also afferted, and what is more generally believed, that a body of ten thousand foot and two thousand horse, under the direction of a British General and staff, would in the course of a fortnight, be embarked for Lifbon, as an auxiliary army for the defence of Portugal against the French Republicans .- The ame of an Irish commander of celebrity is even tentioned to head these forces.
