LEXINGTON, June 4. By a gentleman from
Cincinnati, we are informed, that capt. Shaum-
berg, aid-de-camp to Gen. Wilkinson, with two
dragoons, left Grenville, about ten days ago for
Detroit and were followed by a company of in-
fantry, in order to take possession of that post.

PITTSBURGH, June 25. Thursday last ar-
rived in town his Excellency Anthony Wayne,
commander in chief of the army of the United
States. His arrival was announced by a dis-
charge of artillery from Fort-Fayette.

From Presqu'isle we hear, that information
had been received there, that the British have
removed all their stores, &c. from Detroit, Nia-
gara, &c. to garrisons which they have erected
in their own territory, and that they have only
left a few men at each of the garrisons, to pre-
vent damage being done, by evil disposed per-
sons, until they are demanded by the proper au-
thority.

PHILADELPHIA, July 18. Last Thursday
evening arrived in this city from Baltimore, the
Chevalier Don Carlos Martinez de Yrujo, his
Catholic Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to
the United States.

Ship John, Captain Tyson, of Baltimore, from
Dublin, was off the capes a few days ago, and
may be expected up in the course of this day or
to-morrow, should the wind prove fair. Ten of
her passengers, fearing they might be fallen in
with by some of the British frigates, left her
some leagues distant from the Capes, and came
up in a pilot-boat yesterday; they saw a Boston
brig from this port, not long after, brought to
by a frigate, which, from the course she was
steering, they are apprehensive must have fallen
in with the John. She had nearly 40 passengers
on board, whose fate we should lament, as it is
to be feared they would experience the same
treatment that others have in their situation.

BALTIMORE, July 21.

Extract of a letter from an officer in the western
army, dated Grenville, June 18.

"Captain Shamburg arrived last evening from
Detroit, to which place he had been dispatched
by the General, on the 29th ult. with letters to
Col. England, the commanding officer there,
and has brought from him, a letter informing,
that he was in hourly expectation of final orders
from Lord Dorchester, to evacuate the posts un-
der his command; that he was so prepared, as to
avail himself of the shortest notice for the pur-
pose, and that as soon as orders should arrive he
would dispatch an express to this quarter with an
information, that they might arrange for the safe
delivery of the public works to the troops of the
United States."

Letters from Paris, received this day, state,
that through the intercession of Mr. Munroe,
there was reason to hope, the decree of the con-
vention, ordering foreigners to quit Paris, would
be ameliorated so as to allow Americans to con-
tinue in that city. They had, however, been
under the necessity of removing.

ANECDOTE.—Mrs. B.—desired Dr. Johnson

case of its not being likely to succeed, she could
bring out something else; upon which the Doc-
