

flux of money for such articles of export, yet it will necessarily reduce their extravagant prices, and be so far serviceable to the people of this country. It is true, indeed, it may likewise lessen the exports of our staple manufactures, yet not to as great an extent as may be imagined, the Spaniards being supplied collaterally with fish linens during the period of hostilities with those kingdoms.

Such was the run on the Bank of England when the Pretender marched into England as far as Derby, that, on one day, the payments were made in silver coin only, the reckoning of which protracted the time, consequently the sums paid off could not have been very great. The news of his march back to Scotland arrived at the capital next day, when the public fears were abated, and confidence restored, but it was some time before any bills would be discounted.

Yesterday the Gentlemen of the Bar had a Meeting at the Exhibition-House in William-street, at which they resolved to embody themselves, with the approbation of Government, for the protection of the peace of the Metropolis.

The Attornies belonging to the several Courts met yesterday in the Chancery Chamber, and were unanimous in offering to form themselves into a Corps, if Government approved of it, for the preservation of the public peace.

The Parliament of this kingdom will certainly meet the 11th of October next.

On Tuesday night a fracas took place between the Tyrone militia and some of the inhabitants in Essex-street, in which two or three of the citizens received considerable injury; the houses also of one or two persons had their shop-windows broken. Sheriff Stamer, agreeable to that active principle which has so laudably and so unremittingly directed his official conduct, was early on the spot to prevent by his interposition the consequences of the riot.

The duties on the last West India and Jamaica fleets, amount to the enormous sum of eight hundred and fifty thousand pounds!

The Hibernia, Captain Brenock, an American vessel, arrived here yesterday from Oporto.—Thirty persons, the crews of five British vessels captured by a French lugger privateer on the 26th ult. and brought into Vigo, were landed from her at Dunleary.

A New York paper of the 6th ult. contains an advertisement for the heirs of the famous Paul Jones, who has left about six thousand acres of land that are now unclaimed.

A house in Merrion-square is prepared for this gentleman's reception, as the apartments at the Castle usually appropriated to the accommodation of a gentleman of his high official station, are at present undergoing necessary repair.

Friday night last, another unfortunate man named Martin, fell into the new cut of the Canal, Harold's-cross, the identical spot where Mr. John Plunker, a few nights since lost his life.

Saturday last, Counsellor Whitestone, driving in his carriage, accompanied by a boy about 12 years old, the horse started, took head, and ran so furiously, that the Counsellor, apprehensive of being overturned, and wishing at least to preserve the boy from danger, threw him out of the chaise into a ditch, by which effort to save him his arm was unfortunately broke. At some distance farther the vehicle was overturned, and the Counsellor thrown from it so violently by the fall, that he fractured his leg, and was otherwise very severely bruised.
