The accounts of the French successes in Italy do not indeed stop here. Yesterday an account was received, that the Telegraph had conveyed news to Calais, just before the failing of the veffel that brought the French papers .- The following is the intelligence which the Telegraph conveyed, and which was received at Calais on on Wednesday morning :-

Adjutant-General Fays, Chief of the Etat-Major, to the General of Division Boucrey.

" Head-quarters, St. Omers, the 4th Complementary Day, (Sept. 20). "The under-mentioned news is too fatisfactory for me not to be eager in fending it you by the speediest means.

BULLETIN TELEGRAPHIC.

" Lifle, the 3d Complementary Day, (Sept. 19). " The Army of Italy, purfuing its conquett, has beaten the Enemy in fix successive battles; taken 1600 men prisoners, 20 standards, 70 pieces of cannon, immense magazines, and 45 leagues of country .- The wrecks of the army, with the General, are furrounded by the Republicanarmy. (Signed) " CHAPPE."

On this intelligence, having no possible means of afcertaining its authenticity, we have only to remark, that it comes in a very fuspicious way, and under very fuspicious circumitances. The Directory might think, that the intelligence from Germany required fome equipoife; and therefore this intelligence is fent, in an extraordinary manner, to accompany to England details which they can no longer fophisticate nor conceal .- Sun.

No politive account of the Island of Newfoundland being taken has yet reached this country.

This morning arrived the Hamburgh Mail which became due on Wednesday. It is filled with circumstantial details relative to the military transactions in Germany, which have terminated fo difastrously to the French, and confirms the entry of the Austrians into Franckfort. Strong reinforcements were on their march through Buhemia, for the purpose of strengthening the Auftrian army under General Latour; we may foon expect therefore to hear of Moreau's being forced to retreat; we hope with a precipitation and loss equal to those of Jourdan.

A dreadful event happened on Thursday evening to the Amphion of 32 guns, Capt. J. Pellew, in Plymouth-harbour. By fome accident, not yet known, the ship blew up, and the greater

part of the crew perished.

By the Raifonable man of war, arrived at Plynouth from Cape Nichola Mole, we have advice, hat the fever which has fo long prevailed there, vas in some degree subsiding; the ravages on oard the flips and on fliore, were certainly very reat, but the deaths are not now fo numerous. The French have fuffered by the fever in a tenold degree to that of the English, and to so low state were the crews of their men of war and ansports, which lately arrived at Cape Francois om Europe, reduced, by what they call the ague, added to the fever, that they were order-I away from the Cape; but whither they are one, was not known at the Mole.

According to feveral Italian and Swifs papers, e insurrection in Corsica has taken a very seriis turn. The French Government seems dermined to take advantage of the favourable oment to throw troops into that island. The ommissioner Salicetti is said to be destined for

Drogheda, Sept. 20. The animal afterwards bit eleven people in the town, and a number of pigs, dogs, &c .- He was purfued by a party of the Dublin Militia, who overtook and that him about a mile from the rown.

Waterford, Sept. 24. A letter from a respectable house in Lisbon, to a merchant in this city, dated the 3d inftant, and received by the laft mail from thence, mentions, that exchange on-London had fallen there lately from 721 to 69 per milirea—the letter concludes as follows:"The fall on exchange thiefly owing to the alarm excited in England for the fafety of this country, which we are not apprehenfive about here; and that alarm will no doubt foon fubfide, as there is no French army towards the Pyrenees, nor Spanish army on this fide, and we can sliew 50,000 disciplined troops, and a very well affected body of people-Winter will, however, foon put all idea of invasion thereabouts out of the question."
