

for a General Pacification. Mr. Hoffman arrived in London yesterday afternoon, with the Answer of the Executive Directory: That we believe to have been so far favourable, that the Passport is granted: Such, at least, was the report last night, in a very well-informed Political Circle.

By letters from General Buonaparte, it appears that the German account of an advantage having been gained over General Massena, is not only unconfirmed, but that, on the contrary, Buonaparte, on the 4th inst. gained a very decisive victory, in consequence of which he got possession of Trente, taking 25 pieces of cannon, 50 waggons, 7 stand of colours, and 6 or 700 men.

The accounts of the French successes in Italy do not indeed stop here. Yesterday an account was received, that the Telegraph had conveyed news to Calais, just before the sailing of the vessel that brought the French papers.—The following is the intelligence which the Telegraph conveyed, and which was received at Calais on Wednesday morning:—

Adjutant-General Fays, Chief of the Etat-Major, to the General of Division Boucrey.

“Head-quarters, St. Omers, the 4th Complementary Day, (Sept. 20).”

“The under-mentioned news is too satisfactory for me not to be eager in sending it you by the speediest means.

“Lille, the 3d Complementary Day, (Sept. 19).”

“The Army of Italy, pursuing its conquest, has beaten the Enemy in six successive battles; taken 1600 men prisoners, 20 standards, 70 pieces of cannon, immense magazines, and 45 leagues of country.—The wrecks of the army, with the General, are surrounded by the Republican army.”

On this intelligence, having no possible means of ascertaining its authenticity, we have only to remark, that it comes in a very suspicious way, and under very suspicious circumstances. The Directory might think, that the intelligence from Germany required some equipoise; and therefore this intelligence is sent, in an extraordinary manner, to accompany to England details which they can no longer sophisticate nor conceal.—Sun.

No positive account of the Island of Newfoundland being taken has yet reached this country.

This morning arrived the Hamburgh Mail which became due on Wednesday. It is filled with circumstantial details relative to the military transactions in Germany, which have terminated so disastrously to the French, and confirms the entry of the Austrians into Franckfort. Strong reinforcements were on their march through Bohemia, for the purpose of strengthening the Austrian army under General Latour; we may soon expect therefore to hear of Moreau's being forced to retreat; we hope with a precipitation and loss equal to those of Jourdan.

A dreadful event happened on Thursday evening to the Amphion of 32 guns, Capt. J. Pellew, in Plymouth-harbour. By some accident, not yet known, the ship blew up, and the greater part of the crew perished.

By the Reasonable man of war, arrived at Plymouth from Cape Nichola Mole, we have advice, that the fever which has so long prevailed there, was in some degree subsiding; the ravages on board the ships and on shore, were certainly very great, but the deaths are not now so numerous. The French have suffered by the fever in a tenfold degree to that of the English, and to so low a state were the crews of their men of war and transports, which lately arrived at Cape Francois from Europe, reduced, by what they call the plague, added to the fever, that they were ordered away from the Cape; but whither they are gone, was not known at the Mole.

According to several Italian and Swiss papers, an insurrection in Corsica has taken a very serious turn. The French Government seems determined to take advantage of the favourable moment to throw troops into that island. The Commissioner Salicetti is said to be destined for

Drogheda, Sept. 20. Sunday evening last, as Mrs. Mead, wife of Mr. Thomas Mead, of Drumcondra, near Ardee, was walking in her garden, accompanied by her sister, Miss Bathfort, they were attacked in a most furious manner by a mad dog.—The animal first leaped on Mrs. Mead's back, without doing any other injury; he afterwards ran at her sister, and bit one of her legs and arms in a most shocking manner, and withdrew; the dog, after going a short distance, returned, as if not content with what he had done, leaped on her, and entirely tore the nose from her face.—She has since continued in a most deplorable state. The animal afterwards bit eleven people in the town, and a number of pigs, dogs, &c.—He was pursued by a party of the Dublin Militia, who overtook and shot him about a mile from the town.

Cork, Sept. 24. Lord Donoughmore, we hear, is about raising a regiment of Volunteers in this city.

It is intended, we understand, to remove the French prisoners at Kinsale to England.

Waterford, Sept. 24. A letter from a respectable house in Lisbon, to a merchant in this city, dated the 3d instant, and received by the last mail from thence, mentions, that exchange on London had fallen there lately from 72½ to 69 per millrea—the letter concludes as follows:—

“The fall on exchange is chiefly owing to the alarm excited in England for the safety of this country, which we are not apprehensive about here; and that alarm will no doubt soon subside, as there is no French army towards the Pyrenees, nor Spanish army on this side, and we can show 50,000 disciplined troops, and a very well affected body of people—Winter will, however, soon put all idea of invasion thereabouts out of the question.”
