 Yesterday evening Paris Journals of the 19th,
 20th, 21st, 22d, and 23d instant, were brought
 to us by express: the only Hamburg Mail
 which was due arrived this morning—so that
 we are thus put in possession of the latest possible
 intelligence from the Continent.
 In our paper of Wednesday, we gave a copy
 of the Bulletin sent by the Telegraph to Calais,
 communicating the important successes of the
 French arms in Italy; but that statement was
 far short of the official details from Buonaparte,
 which our readers will find in the preceding col-
 umns.
 Wurmser, believing that Buonaparte would
 advance straight through Tyrol towards Inspruck
 marched his forces round towards Verona, with
 the intention of cutting off the French General's
 communications and surrounding him in the dan-
 gerous defiles of Tyrol.
 Buonaparte, apprized of this design, turned
 round to his right, and by a sudden and unex-
 pected march came up with Wurmser, near Bas-
 sano, where a general battle was fought on the
 6th instant, in which the Austrians were totally
 routed, and Wurmser narrowly escaped being
 made prisoner.
 General Wurmser, with 8000 men, the whole
 wreck of his army, fled to take refuge in Mantua:
 his army, six weeks ago, consisted of 70,000 men!
 Colonel Craufurd was still alive on the 13th.
 He had been twice trepanned. The French left
 him at Nuremberg.
 The Duke of York has given orders that all
 General and other Officers on the Staff, as also
 all Regimental Officers, except such as may be
 employed on the recruiting service, shall remain
 at their present stations till farther orders.
 By a letter from an officer at the Nore, we are
 informed that the Dutch fleet have never yet
 made their appearance at sea. The Reunion fri-
 gate has been constantly on the look out in the
 absence of Admiral Macbride. The report of
 their coming out originated from the Reunion
 having one day gone so close into the Texel, that
 a Dutch frigate and four brigs were dispatched
 to drive her off the coast; when in the chase,
 the Reunion, by a skilful tack, had nearly suc-
 ceeded in cutting them off in the face of their
 own fleet, who could afford no assistance, there
 being at that time a lee tide. The Reunion pas-
 sed so near two of the brigs as to fire on them.
 The next day the Reunion boarded a Dutch pilot
 boat, who informed her that 3 men were killed
 on board the brigs, and the masts of the others
 much damaged.
