

reported when Captain Radcliffe left, that Moreau's army had been totally defeated by the Austrians, and was dispersed in every direction. Various and contradictory reports of advantages gained over this army under Jourdan, are in general circulated. In addition to the Lord Mayor's letter, a letter, of Ostend, who arrived yesterday and who left Flushing on Monday, that accounts had been received at Flushing before he left it, of a complete victory having been obtained over Jourdan by the Archduke on the 2d instant, and that the former had been obliged to cross the Rhine, leaving behind him a considerable quantity of artillery. Mr. Devette further states, that he had been reported at Flushing and Ostend, that he had been defeated by General Latour on the 19th inst. and had begun to retreat.

These reports merely as such.—The Edinburgh mail which arrived this morning contains no statements from any quarter of a more favorable nature than the 18th instant.

By Paris papers of the 27th, received yesterday, it appears that on the 15th, General Moreau, who had taken refuge in Mantua, ordered the garrison of that place to defend two posts called the Favorite & St. George, which were attacked by several French divisions, and were defeated with the loss of 5000 men, and a considerable quantity of cannon.—He is now closely shut up in Mantua.—The Austrian garrison of Porto Cervo surrendered prisoners of war.

By a letter from Ratibon, dated the 12th, that on the preceding day, the general Moreau's army was defeated near the Imperial Generals, Frolich and Berg, with the loss of 2000 killed and 1500 prisoners. After this defeat the French retreated in every direction.

The Vienna Gazette, without mentioning Moreau's defeat, states that his army was retreating rapidly: he must therefore have been in retreat before the action which terminated to his advantage.

The report of passengers in an American ship arrived at Liverpool, from Boston, who arrived the 1st of last month passed through the Squadron on the banks of Newfoundland, that it was not Richery's fleet from Cadiz, but a fleet that failed from Brest in the middle of the month.
