We this morning received by express the Paris Papers up to the 3d instant inclusive; they contain a most curious and important official notice published by the Directory, on the subject of the teports recently spread both here and at Paris, of the proposition made by the British Court, towards opening a negociation for Peace. We present to our Readers a literal version of this paper, that they may reason on its contents from the genuine text: It will shew, notwithstanding their conduct in having granted a Passport, what were the real featiments repecting the fincerity of the British Cabinet:

OFFICIAL NOTE extracted from the Journal of the Defenders of the Country.

Different Journals have afferted that an English Plenipotentiary has arrived in Paris, and has prefented himself to the Directory, but that his propolals not appearing to be fatisfactory, he has received orders to quit France inflantly .- All

these affertions are equally false.

The statements made in the English papers of a Minister to be fent to Paris to treat for peace, bring to our recollection the overtures made by M. Wickham to the Ambailador of the Republic at Baand the reports relative to Mr. Hammond's mission to the Court of Prussia. We have not forgotten the infignificant or rather cunning duplicity and punic style of Mr. Wickham's note.

According to the partizans of the English Minister, it was at Paris that Mr. Hammond was to go to propose peace; when his determination was published, and it was known that he was gone to Prullia, the fame persons repeated that it was to halten peace, and yet the well known object of that negociation was to prevail on Prusha to violate the treaties with the Republic,

and to enter again into the coalition.

The court of Berlin, faithful to its engagements, has rejected these perfidious propositions. But in making this intrigue have a million of peace, the English Minister joined to the hope of creating a new enemy to France, that of justifying a continuation of the war to the eyes of the English nation, and of throwing all the odium of it on the French Government. Such was also the object of Mr. Wickham's note. Such is also that of the affertions made at this time in the

English papers.

This object will appear evident, if we confider how difficult it is, that the ambitious Government of England should wish sincerely for a peace, which will deprive her of her maritime preponderance, re-ellablish the liberty of the feas, afford a fpring and refources to the Spanish, Dutch and French marines; and will carry to the greatest degree of prosperity, the industry and the commerce of France, Spain, and Holland, nations in which the has always found rivals and enemies of her own whenever they become weary of being her dupes. But we shall cease to give credit to the pacific intentions of the English Minister, when we know that his gold and his intrigues, that his fecret and open infinuations attach more than ever to the cabinet of Vienna, and are one of the principal obflacles to negociations into which the cabinet would have been led by ittelf, for the purpose of obtaining

Finally, we shall cease to give credit, when we confider the moment at which the report of

these overtures is circulated.

The English nation supports with impatience the continuance of the war, it is necessary to anfwer its complaints and its reproaches. The Parliament is about to open its Sellion; it is neceffary to close the mouths of those speakers who may speak against the war; it is necessary to justify the demand of new taxes; and for ob-
