To THOMAS GRADY, Esq; Assistant Barrister for the County of Limerick,

We, the Magistrates and Grand Jury of the Quarter Sessions, held in and for the County of Limerick, have beheld with a Satisfaction, we feel ourselves bound to express, the Patience, Ability, and Professional Knowledge, with which you have discharged the arduous Duty of Assistant Barrister for this County.

The Integrity, which marked the Character of your Predecessor, his Experience as a Lawyer, and the private Virtues which endeared him to us all, rendered it a difficult Task for him, who succeeded, to satisfy and conciliate in an equal degree; yet we are anxious to declare, that you have conducted yourself in such manner, in the execution of your Office, as almost to obliterate our sense of public loss in the decease of Mr. Dwyer, and to leave behind only that sentiment of personal Respect, which the Recollection of him cannot fail to excite.

We think it necessary to conclude by observing, that the Order, Decorum, and Regularity preserved in the Court, and your firm and dignified Investigation of a gross, dark, and complicated Fraud, without regard to Rank or Fortune, claim our warmest Approbation.

To BENJAMIN FREND, Esq.

SIR,

The most substantial Return I can make for the very flattering Address which you have so politely presented, is to endeavour by a firm discharge of my Duty not to forfeit the good Opinion my Conduct at this Sessions appears to have impressed, nor to fully the Recommendation to which I am indebted for my Appointment.

To check the spirit of Litigation, and the disposition to Riot, which at present unhappily subsists amongst the lower Classes of the People, and instead thereof to establish a love for Order, and a due obedience to the Laws, shall be the unremitting Exertions of my Office; nor am I without the strongest hopes of effecting this great Purpose, if supported (as I trust I shall be) by the constant attendance of respectable Jurors. Sensible of the necessity of this, I have requested that the Sheriff may summon both upon Grand and Petty Juries, (Magistrates excepted) the most respectable Men of the Division in which the Sessions shall be holden, and I expect to make such Arrangements as to preclude the necessity of their attending for more than two Days at any Sessions.

Let me conclude by declaring, that I felt most forcibly the difficulty I encountered in succeeding my much valued Predecessor, which consideration highly enhanced the kindness I received from the Magistrates, Grand Jurors, and other Gentlemen of the County who attended this Sessions, and let me add, that if it shall hereafter appear that I have been an Instrument in promoting the Peace and Prosperity of this County, I shall always consider the Appointment to my present Office as the happiest Circumstance of my Life.

To the Sheriff of the County of Limerick, Greeting, Whereas William Ryves is the County of Limerick, Esq; by his writ, dated the Tenth day of March, in the Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Three, sealed with his Seal and perfected at the Court in the Parish of Saint Michael the Archangel, Ward of St. Michael, and County of the City of Limerick, now remaining of Record in the Office of the Clerk of the Peace, and of our Exchequer in Ireland, I am firmly bound to us in the Sum of Three Thousand Pounds Sterling, to be paid when demanded. And has not as yet paid or caused to be paid the said Sum as is layed, and we willing that the said Three Thousand Pounds Sterling, should be paid to us with all speed as is just and because William Ryves is dead, as we have received the Certificate of the Sheriff of the County of Limerick, We therefore command you that you do not suffer any liberty in your Bailiwick, but do execute and by honest and lawful men of your said County, make known to the Heirs of the said William Ryves, well as the several Tenants of all the Lands and Tenements which the said William Ryves was seized of at the time of his death, that they be before the Bench of the Exchequer, at the King's Courts, Dublin, in the County of St. Hillary next coming, to shew and prove if any they have or know, wherefore we have execution against them of all the Lands and Tenements of the said William Ryves, for the said Three Thousand Pounds Sterling, and you are to shew the Names of those by whom you are bound to shew and prove, and this Writ.
