I did not think a verdict in the Court of Exchequer a proper ground for the House to proceed on—he thought that evidence should be brought before them. He had heard, and had some reason to believe that there were some failings on the part of the Lady, but it was not impossible but her friends might, if time were allowed, bring to the bar of the House, evidence favourable to her. He had heard it said, also, that there were some deficiencies in conjugal duty on the Noble Lord's part; and this might be explained by evidence, which he thought should be brought before the House.

Sir Henry Cavendish called on the Speaker to declare, whether it were not the usual form for the House in such cases, to call evidence to the bar, to justify their concurrence.

The Speaker declared that the House did in all such cases require evidence to be adduced, but that the proper time was when the House went into committee on the bill.

Sir H. Cavendish said, that he had designed to bring some evidence which he thought would render it impossible for the House to concur in the bill now proposed; but that, from the sickness of the meeting of Parliament, and some other circumstances, he had been prevented; and as he could not be certain of his being able to procure this evidence, he would waive any opposition to the bill.

The bill was then read a second time and it was ordered that the House do, to-morrow, resolve itself into a committee to take this bill into consideration.—The House then adjourned till next day.

#### WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 26.

The Speaker reported to the House that his Excellency had declared the Royal Assent to the Bill for suspending the Privileges of the Habeas Corpus Act, in relation to persons apprehended on charges of Treasonous Conspiracy.

The House then, on the motion of Mr. Solicitor General, went into a Committee on the Wellmearh Divorce Bill.—Heard evidence, went thro' the Bill, (with decided opposition from Col. Blaquier)—reported, read the third time, passed, and ordered to the Lords.

Mr. Secretary Pelham moved that the House on its rising, do adjourn until Monday evening.

This was opposed by Mr. Curran, on the ground that it was highly indecent on the part of his Majesty's Ministers, the instant they had secured their own purposes, in procuring a bill to pass at the dead hour of the night, without a minute's previous notice, for suspending the liberties of the people, and also a vote for half a million, to impose upon them new burdens of taxation, yet now to pass a long adjournment, before the House had time to turn an eye to the grievances and distresses of the people.

Mr. Curran, after advertising pointedly to the barbarities perpetrated towards the Catholics of the County of Armagh, by which not only hundreds were without respect to age, sex, or infirmity, put to death; but 1400 families driven from their dwellings, their property plundered, and their houses burnt about their heads, and this without any effectual steps for repression of the mischief on the part of Government—urged most strongly the necessity and justice of a Parliamentary inquiry; and signified his intention to move for a Committee to inquire into the rise and progress of those disturbances, and what steps Government had taken to suppress them.

Mr. Secretary Pelham, in adhering to his motion for the adjournment, begged not to be understood as wishing to preclude inquiry, which
