At a Meeting of the Citizens of Limerick, held at the Exchange, on Tue fday laft, purfuant to an Invitation in the Limerick Chronicle of the 3d Inft. the following Refolitions were unanimoully adopted,

Mr. Sheriff Watton, in the Chair, 1. That a Society be formed for the Relief of the Sick Poor of this City, and we do hereby form ourfelves into a Society for that purpofe.

2. That each Member contribute Yearly Four British Shillings or upwards, and that one-half of the Subscription at least, be paid in hand .- Subscription List to be open till 1st of January. Any Donation will be thankfully received.

3- That the objects of this Charity shall be such as are not supported by any other Charitable Institution in this City; that all Street Beggars shall be excluded from any advantages whatever, and that it shall extend to all other Poor afflicted Perfons, of every Religious profession.

4. That proper Perfons be chosen for Treasurer and Secretary-and twelve Laymen Vifitors to be chosen Quarterly, fix Protestants and fix Roman Catholics; two of whom shall be appointed every Week in rotation, to vifit fuch Perfons as are to be relieved. These twelve shall form a Committee for examining the claims of the Perfons recommended as proper objects, and for proportioning the Relief accordingly. That for this purpose the Committee shall hold a Weekly Meeting.

5. That in order to prevent imposition, no Perfon shall be relieved until seen by two Visitors; the Sum to be given by the Visitor or Visitors shall be fixed in the Committee; but in cafe the Vifitors. judge the object not fo distressed as represented, they may withhold the whole, or part, returning the Money to the Fund.

6. That a Registry shall be kept of the Persons relieved; fetting forth their diffress and places of abode; the Sum given and how often relieved; and that it shall be always open for the inspection of
