**LIMERICK,—DECEMBER 7.**

At a Meeting of the Citizens of Limerick, held at the Exchange, on Tuesday last, pursuant to an Invitation in the Limerick Chronicle of the 3d Inst. the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted,

Mr. Sheriff Watson, in the Chair,

1. That a Society be formed for the Relief of the Sick Poor of this City, and we do hereby form ourselves into a Society for that purpose.
2. That each Member contribute Yearly Four British Shillings or upwards, and that one-half of the Subscription at least, be paid in hand.—Subscription List to be open till 1st of January. Any Donation will be thankfully received.
3. That the objects of this Charity shall be such as are not supported by any other Charitable Institution in this City; that all Street Beggars shall be excluded from any advantages whatever, and that it shall extend to all other Poor afflicted Persons, of every Religious profession.
4. That proper Persons be chosen for Treasurer and Secretary—and twelve Laymen Visitors to be chosen Quarterly, six Protestants and six Roman Catholics; two of whom shall be appointed every Week in rotation, to visit such Persons as are to be relieved. These twelve shall form a Committee for examining the claims of the Persons recommended as proper objects, and for proportioning the Relief accordingly. That for this purpose the Committee shall hold a Weekly Meeting.
5. That in order to prevent imposition, no Person shall be relieved until seen by two Visitors; the Sum to be given by the Visitor or Visitors shall be fixed in the Committee; but in case the Visitors judge the object not so distressed as represented, they may withhold the whole, or part, returning the Money to the Fund.
6. That a Registry shall be kept of the Persons relieved; setting forth their distress and places of abode; the Sum given and how often relieved; and that it shall be always open for the inspection of Subscribers.
7. That proper Books be kept, in which regular entries shall be made of all Donations and Subscriptions; together with the Expenditures. That the
