re received this morning, (20th, at
of the Death of the Empress of
Russia, 17th of last month, in the 67th
year, and the 34th of her reign. She
sat on the throne of that kingdom, by
the Duke Paul Petrowitch.

Empress of Russia had been slightly in-
firm a few days before her death; but her
illness was not of that nature to occasion
her death. At ten o'clock on the
16th ult. she was seized with a fit of
apoplexy, and her attendants found
her senseless upon the ground. From the
first attack she remained insensible, to
the day of her decease, which took place about
midnight on the night of the 17th.

Hamburgh mails which arrived this
morning do not bring any news from Italy of so
early a period when Mantua is stated
to have been relieved, on the 22d and 23d ult.
however, from Roveredo, dated the
21st ult. that the French had abandoned
positions on the 22d, and had drawn to-
wards Verona, where a battle was expected.—
The retreat of the French has probably
been occasioned by a new advancing of the army
of Alvinzi, by which the enemy would
be in danger of being cut off.—In the
late engagement between the Austrian and
French armies, General Brabeck was killed;
and that of the 17th, 78 French Officers
among the prisoners made by the army of
General Davidovich.

Vienna accounts confess the defeat of the
French at Arcola, but claim a victory over
the French two days afterwards, on the 17th.
Accounts from the Rhine state, that there
has been very severe fighting at Kehl, with great
loss on both sides.

The outward-bound West-India fleet failed
on Monday, under convoy of the York and Eurus.
The ship Timms, the Messenger, met Mr. Ellis,
on Thursday, on the road to Paris, where he
is to arrive on Thursday.

On last night we received the Paris papers
dated the 14th to the 17th inst. Their contents
are interesting, though not of the first impor-
tance. From Italy there are no official accounts,
but the non-official articles are contradictory.—
The papers state, that the head-quarters of
Bonaparte have been transferred to Cremona.
Others assert, that Alvinzi has retired behind
the Brenta; and that Buonaparte is receiving
large reinforcements.

fire, sans bed, sans every thing but sorrow—
whose sad cup presents nothing but cold water,
imbittered by the gall tears of affliction, and
let him learn a zeal for an higher luxury than
epicurean genius can invent—"the luxury of
doing good."
