

The Charleville Volunteer Cavalry with that public spirit by which they ever were actuated, have at this critical period, offered their services to co-operate with his Majesty's troops, in any manner Government think most conducive for the public good.

Affidavit made before Mr. White, of Bantry, 2d January, 1797, and forwarded by him to his Brother in Cork, and likewise by him to the Mayor of Cork.

Mr. Warren, Master of the brig Mary, of Bristol, bound from Lisbon to Bristol, was taken off Scilly by the frigate National Cockade, the 20th December last, about 9 o'clock in the morning; then in company with the La Fraternite, National frigate, on board which latter were the Admiral, and Commander in Chief of the troops; the Nisler (74 guns) and Romaine frigate were also in company, and understood from the officers that they consisted of 52 sail—18 of them of the line, 16 frigates, the rest corvettes, luggers, and store ships; one of their 74's was lost coming out of Brest, with 1600 men on board, 60 of whom were only saved, that they had on board the fleet 26,000, including 5000 dismounted cavalry, 75,000 stand of arms, 100 pieces of field artillery, with a proportional number of ordnance stores; when they left Brest, 15th December, there were 4 three-deckers, 5 or 6 two-deckers, fit for service, with 60,000 troops ready for embarkation, for which had they effected their landing here, they meant to have returned; for that they also intended to invade England from Cherbourg and the neighbouring ports; say that the Tourville, one of their fleet (80 guns) before they made Bantry Bay, run down a large frigate and all perished being 600 men. Previous to their getting under weigh, they dismasted the Sonvillante frigate, scuttled her, and left her to sink. They also burnt the Sisters, of Liverpool, Captain Thomas Parker. Capt. Warren thinks they have only 14 days provisions on board, and that they are in a very disabled state; when they left Brest they were in three divisions, one stood to the Southward, another to the North, the third to the West, to meet at Cape Clear, the place of Rendezvous.
