

The fleet was well equipped in every particular, and the transports chosen as fast sailers; 60 more transports with troops on board, were ready to follow the expedition when a landing was made good.

Cargo and men on board La Ville de l'Orient (a 74 cut down and armed en flute) 1 captain, 1 lieutenant, 4 officers; 380 hussars; 2 ten-inch mortars; 2 eight pound guns; 19,000 shells; 1000 muskets; 10,000 cartridge boxes filled with ball cartridges; 380 barrels flour; 26 pipes brandy; 10 bales cloathing; 600 saddles; 5 boxes shoes; artillery carriages; the general's carriage—When La Ville de l'Orient and Druid made sail for Kinsale, the Unicorn and another frigate were in chase of the remains of the scattered French Fleet, which, it is most likely will be the means of detaining them, by action or manœuvring, until Lord Bridport, who was not far off, comes up with his fleet consisting of twenty-three ships of the line and several frigates; a force, which when spread, the French can scarcely escape.

The Captains of the French Fleet had in their orders, we understand, if after eight days they could not succeed in reaching Ireland, to make for the first ports in France or Spain. They must have been apprehensive, no doubt, that the English Fleet would overtake them; and this accounts for the entire of the French Fleet not rendezvousing in Bantry Bay after the storm of the 26th and 27th December.

By the Packet which arrived this evening, it appears that a division of the French Fleet, consisting of 6 ships of the line, and 4 frigates, under the command of Rear-Admiral Bouvette, has returned to Brest.—This intelligence was contained in a Paris Paper of the 7th instant.

There are now no French Ships on the Irish Coasts. [Courier.]
