The Captains of the French Fleet had it in orders, we understand, if after eight days they could not fucceed in reaching Ireland, to make for the first ports in France or Spain. They must have been apprehensive, no doubt, that the English Fleet would overtake them; and this accounts for the entire of the French Fleet not rendezvouzing in Bantry Bay after the fform of

the 26th and 27th December.

By the Packet which arrived this evening, it appears that a division of the French Fleet, confilting of 6 ships of the line, and 4 frigates, under the command of Rear-Admiral Bouvette, has recurned to Brest .- This intelligence was contained in a Paris Paper of the 7th instant.

There are now no French Ships on the Irish Courier.
