It is also His Excellency's Pleasure that you should transmit to me to be laid before him, a Return of the Number of Men that may be re-enlisted, specifying their Names, and the Bounty paid to each Man; and His Excellency wishes it to be thoroughly understood that the Bounty now offered will not be increased.
