The Foundling Hospital committee having sat, and entered upon the examination of witnesses, it was agreed, after a short conversation, that the witnesses be discharged from attendance on the House; that the committee report progress, and sit again to-morrow.

Cove of Cork, May 3. Yesterday intelligence was received by Admiral Kingsmill, of a French cutter being seen the day before on this coast, off Youghal. The Admiral immediately dispatched the Diana, Capt. Falkner, in quest of her. The Diana was clear out of the harbour, by nine o'clock in the morning, with a strong breeze from the westward.

This morning arrived a cutter from Sir Roger Curtis's Squadron, and sailed again immediately to join the Squadron consisting of seven sail of the line and a frigate, who were lying too off the harbour; on her joining they immediately made sail, and stood to the southward. Wind at west.

May 7. Yesterday arrived his Majesty's ship Diana, Capt. Falkner, from a cruise; saw nothing of the privateer said to be on the coast.

This morning arrived his Majesty's hired cutters Expedition and Fox, with eleven victuallers from Waterford; also arrived the Tartar cutter, Lieutenant Skinner, from Dublin, with three victuallers; parted the Unicorn and Hazard off Tuscar, on Wednesday last, with a large convoy of linen ships, &c. from Belfast, Newry and Dublin, for London.
