The following account was yesterday received from the County Westmeath :- Early yesterday morning (Monday) a party of the Delvin Yeomanry having been out patrolling, stopped near the bridge of Thomastown to consider of their further course, when they were fired upon by a body of Defenders who had been lying in wait in the ditches which bounded the road; the Yeomanry instantly returned the fire, and having put the affaffins to flight, purfued and took five of them, one a principal, who was taken under arms. Several muskers and pitchforks, with combustible matter for burning houses, were found on the ground where the attack was made.

The Nine Sisters, from Jamaica to this port, arrived here on Monday last, with a valuable cargo of rum and fugar. This vessel is one of a flotilla, confisting of eleven flaips, under conove, bound to feveral ports in the two channels.

Yesterday a vessel from Bourdeaux, laden with wine, arrived in our harbour, after a paffage of feven days. The passengers report that provisions and money are in great abundance at Bourdeaux, and that trade was beginning to emerge from its late unfortunate depression. The greatest rejoicings had just been made on account of the peace with the Emperor of Germany; and that it was the general opinion, that a ceffation of hostilities with England would shortly take

When the vessel which arived yesterday from Bourdeaux failed, which was on Wednesday last, fifty transports, laden with military stores for Brest, fell down the Garonne, and proceeded to fea. It was confidently reported at Bourdeaux, that the armament at Brest had Portugal alone

for its object.

After the execution, the troops marched in ordinary time by the bodies, which had been conveyed to the Churchyard, and the ceremony closed, leaving the strongest symptoms of impression on all the spec-
