

...were retrained from destroying the house, the former standing with the rest of his men at the door, while the latter went through the house with a file of men.

The increased pay of the Line, Militia and Fencibles, commenced on the 2d day of the present month. The Private Soldier, by this act of Royal favour, has 1s. a day nett pay, which with the advantage of bounty, cloathing, lodging, fire, candles, and camp allowance, places him in a situation far superior (especially when it is considered that he is paid and attended in sickness) to the condition of any of the working classes in life.

It gives us pleasure to communicate to the public, that the brave Serjeant Collin, of the Armagh Militia, has been promoted to an Ensigncy in the Regiment, for his able and gallant defence of himself and party, when attacked lately in the County of Monaghan, by a numerous and desperate banditti of United Irishmen.

**Belfast, June 5.** This day being held as the anniversary of his Majesty's Birth-day, the troops in garrison here including the Yeomanry Corps of Belfast, both cavalry and infantry, were drawn up in line in High-street, (General Lake and his Staff on horseback) when a *feu-de-joye* was fired in honour of the day. Every possible appearance of loyalty was shewn by a numerous attendance of the inhabitants of the town, and the troops fired with the greatest exactness and regularity. On Wednesday last, a detachment of the Dunluce Cavalry, assisted by a party of the Giants-Caufway-Corps, commanded by Captain Wray, in a general search for arms in the neighbourhood of Bushmills, took up about seventy muskets, and twenty pikes and shafts, (in one town-land) together with four men, all of whom they escorted into Ballymoney, and delivered to Major Sinclair, commanding officer.

On Saturday last, the Rev. Mr. Barber, of Rathfryland, was brought into town in a post-chaise, escorted by a party of the 22d Light Dragoons. This gentleman is confined in a private house, with a centinel over him.

Two regiments of Scots Fencible Cavalry, have embarked at Liverpool for this kingdom.
