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LIMERICK, — JUNE 14.


Monday evening, the Longford and South Mayo Militia Regiments, which were quartered in the neighbourhood of Stoneville, marched in and pitched their Tents on the Camp ground.— Yesterday, the South Cork Militia, commanded by the Right Hon. Lord Doneraile, and a detachment of the Royal Artillery, under the command of Lieut. Col. Wright, also marched into Stoneville Camp, the remainder of the Troops are expected there this week.

Yesterday morning, James O'Neil, and Peter Murneen, soldiers in the Louth Militia, were taken from this City to the Fair Green at Adare, in this County, attended by all the Troops in this Garrison, viz. the First Fencible Cavalry, Artillery, Tyrone, and Londonderry Militia, with the South Cork Militia, who had marched in from Ennis the preceding evening;—at Adare, they were joined by the Louth Regiment from Tárbert, &c.—the Longford Regiment from Rathkeal, and the South Mayo Regiment from Newcastle—the whole under the command of Major-Gen. Sir James Duff, Bart.—When the troops were formed into an half circle, the Prisoners were taken from the Carriage by the entire of their own Regiment, and marched in front to the spot designed for their execution; when, after spending above an hour in prayer with their attendant Clergymen, (Roman Catholic) the Rev. Mr. Herbert and the Rev. Mr. Magrath, they gave the signal for their being ready, when 16 of the Company to which they belonged advanced and performed their duty.—The execution was conducted with a solemnity highly becoming the melancholy occasion.—The Prisoners, having in the most unequivocal manner acknowledged their guilt in taking the Oath, as dictated by the United Irishmen, seemed determined as much as in them lay, to expiate their crime, by warning the surrounding Soldiery to be faithful to their Oath of Allegiance, and support that Constitution which they were bound to defend.—Their Corpses were taken for interment to the front of Stoneville Camp.

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
