

...hope this expedition will be more successful than the former.
 "The Brigands have attacked Irois, but have been beaten off. They left about 150 dead on the field, 80 wounded, and about as many taken prisoners; notwithstanding which they have the impudence to threaten an attack on Jeremie, Irois. In that affair we lost one Major, two Captains, and one Lieutenant (French) killed, and several Officers wounded. The British had but one Captain slightly wounded, and about 40 or 50 men killed and wounded."

"Port-au-Prince, May 7, 1797.
 The expedition I spoke of in my letter of the 1st inst. (of the Brigands against Jeremie), is entirely upset. They were to have attacked it in three columns; one landed at Irois, the second at a place between that and Jeremie, called L'Ance Eros; and the third was to march up the Country. The column to land at L'Ance Eros came in gun-boats, &c. from Tiburon—they went into the bay, and were landing when the Magicienne frigate was by chance passing by. Her commander guessed what they were at, and anchored in the bay, bringing his guns to bear on them, and exposing himself to their fire in return. An action immediately commenced, in which the Magicienne killed 4000 Brigands: the people on shore at the same time attacked them in the rear, and killed every man except two or three. Rigaud's brother was wounded and taken prisoner. The third column, hearing the fate of the other two, retreated; and in their retreat destroyed all the plantations they could. In this business the Brigands must have lost eleven or twelve hundred men; for there were at L'Ance Eros 800, not a man of whom escaped; and their loss at Irois is much greater than they have represented it to be: they lost all their ammunition, gun-boats, cannon, &c. at L'Ance Eros."

The following 7 mutineers of the Leopard, viz. Denis Sullivan, Alexander Lawson, William Welch, Joseph Fearon, Wm. Rose, George Shave, and Thomas Sterling, were executed at the Nore, pursuant to their sentence; four on board that ship, and three on board the Lancaster. The sentences on Robertson and Habbigan, recommended to mercy, were respited. The following letter was written by the late Robert Lee, to his Brother, on the morning of his execution:

"From my Cell, Citadel Prison, Plymouth, July 6, 1797.
 MY DEAR BROTHER,
 Your exertions to save my life cannot now avail—yesterday the order for my execution this day arrived. I have but a few short moments to live, and, I trust, that, therefore, what I wish to impart to you, will be received by you with that seriousness with which it must come from the heart of a dying man.

"Like you, I have been misled by the sophistries of those who deny the truths of the gospel, and deride the evidence of God's word—like you, I gave them implicit confidence; but, the awfulness of my present state has induced a candid examination of them; and the arguments of the enemies of Divine Revelation, appear now to me in the vilest colours.

"I have thought it necessary to seek the aid of a Minister of the Gospel, who, I trust, is a witness to my conversion—to my regeneration—and will testify it—as far as he can be supposed to place a confidence in the sincerity of it. On subject I have no time to add more, than to port you to avail yourself of the opportunity I have, to renounce those opinions, which near proving fatal to my eternal happiness after, through the merits of his dear Son Christ, the Redeemer of Mankind.

The Gentleman who has been considerably instrumental in producing my conversion, will, on my request, take up the pen to you such arguments as his superior experience will dictate.
