Cork, July 29.—Yesterday Gen. Hutchinson and Colonel Longfield, were elected Members to represent this City in Parliament; and this day Lord Kingsborough and Lord Boyle were unanimously elected to represent the County.

This day the Galatea and Doris frigates, brought into Cork, a French privateer, and two large Portuguese ships, from the Brazils, taken by the privateer, said to be worth 120,000l.—One of the ships got on shore in the river, and most of the sugar will be lost.—She had 900 bags of cotton, 450 chests and 300 bags or barrels of sugar, with an immense quantity of hides on board.—It is reported a third Brazil-man is come in. The privateer threw all her guns overboard in the chase.
