When Spain commenced hostilities against Portugal in the war ended in 1762, and that a Spanish army penetrated into the Portuguese territory, it hastened Great Britain to enter into a negociation for peace with the Courts of Versailles and Castile, though in the midst of a career of victories, and also of obtaining fresh foreign territorial conquests, lest the Court of Lisbon might be compelled to terms which would have proved injurious to the British commerce, and more moderate demands were therefore made at the Congress for peace, on the part of the Court of London, than otherwise might have been expected. This leads us naturally to remark, how much more prosperous the affairs of Britain were at that period than the present, and what firmer reliance Portugal had on British exertion and success, than at this particular crisis.

Our Parliament, it is now said, will not meet for dispatch of business until the usual time in January. We think otherwise, for these reasons: there can be, we presume, little doubt, but that the negociations at Lisse will have a pacific issue; if so, from the great events that have occurred, such as the cession of Belgium, including maritime Flanders to the French Republic, the possession of the several Venetian ports in the Adriatic to the House of Austria, by which the will in future be considered as a maritime power, and, above all, the Portuguese dereliction of treaties with England, in consequence of the peace which her most faithful Majesty has been forced into, must inevitably change, in a great degree, the whole commercial system of Europe; to meet which, a great alteration will be necessary in our import and export duties, inasmuch as to cause an almost entire new tariff, for the regulation of our foreign trade. This will be an arduous business, and will require the British and Irish Legislatures to set about it, as soon as the preliminaries of peace are signed, to be in readiness for further commercial treaties.

Several changes in the great law departments are confidently spoken of, as determined to take place before the opening of the next law term. As the arrangements are variously reported, we shall for a while delay repeating them; but that the change is resolved on we have no doubt.

A gang of robbers have lately made their appearance in the county of Dublin, of rather an alarming kind, as these freebooters generally assemble in a body of from 20 to 30 at a time.
