During the week, about 200 foldiers, belonging to different regiments, and under various circumstances, made prisoners by the enemy, arraigned in the Metropolis from France: they are ragged, bordering upon nakedness, but in good health.

Seven of the men who escaped from the Infantry at the Nore, were taken in the Lynx by Capt. Pearson, of the Stork sloop, cruizing in the channel.

No more of the Mutineers are to be tried at Greenhithe. On the conclusion of the trial of the people of the Standard, Vice-Admiral Pasley struck his flag on board the Centaur, which with the Neptune and some others, is under orders to join the Channel fleet.

Should a male heir to the property of the late Mr. Thelluson exist in eighty years, the earliest period at which by the will it is directed to be payable, he will be entitled to receive thirty-four millions three hundred thousand pounds, a sum infinitely too great to be possessed by a subject under any Government. The Duke of Orleans was in the receipt of 350,000l. a year, the greater part of which was employed in political machinations.

Mutineers of the Saturn.—Parry, Farrel, and Kenyon, who were executed on the 21st instant at Plymouth, were sent from the Prudent, and not from the Cambridge, as stated in one account; one of the remaining prisoners is pardoned, who was particularly recommended; Evans and Dixon remain as we have already stated; two, who were recommended by the Court, and three are under sentence of death without any recommendation, remain yet unnoticed; and one was acquitted with, and another without a reprimand. On the occasion of the execution, Capt. Lane ordered the boats to form in two lines, having the launch and boat, with the coffins between them, going down the harbour, and in a semicircle round the Saturn's bows afterwards.

A Life of the late Catherine II. Empress of Russia, has just been published at Paris. It is said to be written with a cautious adherence to truth.—The strongest feature which it gives of her character, is her marked aversion to her son, to is now her successor. He owed his preferment, it is there said, to the public regard, which was always fixed upon him; and would have been sacrificed to the ambition of Prince Sminkin, if it were thought that the deed could be done with impunity. The Prince being one indisposed, the people, who had not forgot the tragic end of Peter III. surrounded the Castle and desired to see him. The Empress immediately brought him forward, pale, trembling, and fearful for her own safety. It is to this lesson of terror, inspired by the people, says the annotator, that they owe the existence of the present government.

In the County Court, Darby Hays, convicted of an assault and an attempt to commit a rape on a child of eleven years old, was sentenced to be whipped three market days, and imprisoned 12 months.

In the City Court, Catherine Henchie, convicted of stealing 14lb. of Almonds out of the shop of Mr. Arundel Hill, grocer, was sentenced to be imprisoned three months. Monday a Boy of 8 years old, fell into the River at the Slip near Baal's Bridge, and what was almost miraculous, floated down under the New Bridge, when a Sailor jumped from the Custom-House Quay, with his cloaths, and rescued the Child from a watery grave.
