

...the English put to death. It was to have taken place in a few days, but was providentially discovered, and this day he is to be hanged."

Yesterday at Guildhall Sir Wm. Herne, Knt. Citizen and Vintner, and Robert Williams, jun. Esq; Citizen and Goldsmith, Aldermen, were sworn into the office of Sheriffs of this city for the year ensuing. After which the keepers of the different gaols presented their keys, and the prisoners were all turned over to them.

An article from Cadiz states, that the troops encamped at St. Roch and Algeziras, before Gibraltar, had received orders to march to that city, and that several battalions had arrived there.

A letter from Antigua, dated August 15, says, that accounts have recently been received at Martinique, that a small Dutch Squadron, consisting of five sail of men of war, and seventeen transports, have arrived at Surinam. It is expected that Admiral Harvey will make an attack on them, for they draw too much water to go up the river Surinam, and lie very much exposed.

The Gazette of last night contains a notice from the Speaker of the House of Commons, that the Governor and Deputy Governor of the Bank of England had, on the 23d instant, notified to him, that the Directors of the said Bank meant to issue Gold Coin to the amount of the dollars now in circulation, and which have been stamped at the Tower." This measure has been adopted in order to put a stop to the circulation of dollars irregularly stamped, which end will be effectually answered by calling in all those which have been legally stamped at the Tower.

By the 6th article of the Treaty of Commerce between this country and America, it is agreed, that, in cases where our merchants cannot obtain just debts due to them, or compensation for loss or damage sustained in the ordinary course of justice, the United States will make full and complete compensation; but this provision is only to extend to such loss as has been occasioned by lawful impediments, and not to those caused by insolvency. A notice to this effect appeared in the London Gazette of the 12th inst.

American Agents are at this time busily employed in purchasing firelocks, pistols, &c. with their usual accoutrements, to be shipped, with consent of Government, for America, on account of the United States.

The value of the arsenals at Venice has been estimated at 100 millions. The army of Buonaparte, in connection with that of the Alps, exceeds 100,000 men.

A letter from the Hague, dated Sept. 16, says, "Twenty-one Commissioners are now appointed to frame a new project of a Constitution, and to present it within the 6 months."

A Vienna article of the 9th says:—"The Italian army of Imperialists, consisting of 132,000 men, is to be reinforced by recruits and troops of the line, which every day pass through that city."

Recruiting for the English has again been forbidden in the north of Germany, under the severest penalties.

At a Court-Martial, assembled and held on board his Majesty's ship Cambridge, in Hainoaze, 25th September, 1797.

The Court proceeded to enquire into the cause and circumstances of the loss of his Majesty's late ship Amazon, and to try Capt. R. Carthew Reynolds, the officers and company of the said ship, for their conduct upon that occasion: and the Court having accordingly made a strict and careful enquiry into the cause and circumstances of the loss of the Amazon, and heard the separate and joint depositions of the officers and company, is of opinion,

"That his Majesty's ship Amazon was lost after a well-disputed action with a French ship, of 74 guns, Les Droits de l'Homme, in Audierne Bay, the Amazon having materially suffered in her masts and rigging, and being far in shore at the close of the engagement.
