

The morning paper called *The Oracle*, says—  
 letters from Rotterdam, Sept. 30. received  
 day, state, that the King of Prussia had de-  
 clared war against France. This information  
 is generally believed, that the premiums on  
 all vessels rose 5 per cent.  
 Admiral Lord Keith has realized a considerable  
 sum by the capture of the Dutch Squadron  
 at the Cape of Good Hope.  
 Accounts from Dunkirk of the 22d ult. the  
 publicaine frigate, of 36 guns, was ready for  
 and would sail in a few days, being manned  
 by 300 seamen, one half of which were  
 Irish.  
 A most uncommon circumstance occurred on  
 Friday in the City Road. A large dog, of the  
 stiff breed, happened to pass near a game  
 cock, when the latter, without any provocation,  
 attacked the dog with the utmost violence. The  
 dog became irritated, and in his turn attacked  
 the game cock. A severe combat ensued; but  
 the vigilance and dexterity of the cock eluded  
 every attempt of the dog to hurt him. At length  
 the cock flew upon the dog's back, and with his  
 beak actually beat out his eyes. He then con-  
 tinued the attack with so much ferocity, that in  
 a short time the dog fell to the ground, when  
 the cock struck him a blow with his heel, which  
 penetrated to his brains, and he instantly ex-  
 pired. There were above 500 persons witnesses  
 of this curious battle.—Fifty guineas were  
 offered for the game cock and refused.  
 Consols this day 49½ 3-8ths.

DUBLIN, — Oct. 16.

About the hour of eleven on Saturday night  
 two hackney coaches drove to the gate of his  
 Grace the Archbishop's Palace at Tallagh, at  
 which some persons alighting knocked, and de-  
 manded admittance, which at first was refused by  
 the porter, alledging that as his Lord was not in  
 the kingdom, he could not permit them to enter;  
 they threatened to force in, declaring, at the  
 same time, that they only came for the five new  
 muskets lately brought there, and what other  
 arms were in the Palace. A great number of  
 men on foot had now joined those who had  
 alighted from the coaches, upon which the por-  
 ter, with the advice of one of the female servants  
 who had come to him, and seeing opposition vain,  
 set the banditti in; who, after possessing them-  
 selves of the muskets in question, together with  
 some blunderbusses and what other arms they  
 could find, quietly left the Palace.

Bandon, Oct. 16. On Friday last, the 2d  
 Fencible Light Dragoons, commanded by Col.

 the ensuing year.

 Militia, (Captain Hennes's) marched hence for  
 Nenagh, to do duty there until further orders.
