Tarbert, Oct. 16. On Monday, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, Brigadier-General Strutt, accompanied by his Brigade Major, arrived here, and the companies of the Royal Tyrone Regiment, with their Field Pieces, being drawn up in the Deer-Park of Sir Edward Leslie, Bart. the General proceeded to review and inspect them; the companies went through their evolutions to the entire satisfaction of the General, after which he entertained all the Officers at Mr. Langan's Inn, in Tarbert. The next day the General inspected the Works, and the Batteries being manned by the Artillery and the men of the Tyrone Regiment, fired several rounds of shot at a Buoy in the river, with great exactness; after which the General dined with the Officers, and on Wednesday proceeded to Limerick. The General had previously reviewed and inspected the several Companies of the Royal Tyrone Regiment at Kilmorney, Castle-Island, Tralee and Dingle, which regiment are now complete to 1000 men:—any panegyric on this truly loyal Corps may be considered unnecessary, but their proper conduct in the several Cantonments, calls forth the praise of the Inhabitants, who find themselves and property protected by real Guardians of the State.

LIMERICK, — October 21.

Two o'clock this evening arrived One Packet, via Waterford, — dated LONDON, Oct. 16.

Capt. Fairfax, whose arrival has been waited with so much anxiety since Friday last, brought Dispatches this morning to the Admiralty from Admiral Duncan, containing the particulars of the late Engagement between the English and Batavian Fleets.

The intelligence brought by Captain Brodie Friday last, is completely confirmed. Nine of the Line, with two Frigates are taken—Brig, it is said, was burnt. Three Admirals, also stated, are made prisoners—though the order of the First Lord of the Admiralty, published this morning mentions only two.

It is acknowledged that a more bloody conflict took place at Sea. The carnage on board English Fleet has no parallel in our Naval History. The killed and wounded on board the British Ships must of course have been immense, and the obstinacy and bravery, it appears, were displayed by any men than that which the British Sailors opposed to the courage of the

Burgess, an officer of much worth, fell in action, and with him, we lament to say 41 gallant Countrymen. On board his vessel were 107 men were wounded. The following is an exact Copy of the Letter sent this morning by Earl Spencer to the Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Limerick, a Copy of which was also posted up at the Coffee-house:—

My Lord, I have the honor of acquainting your Lordship that Captain Fairfax has just arrived with Dispatches from Adm. Duncan, confirming the intelligence brought by Lieut. Brodie, and that 9 sail of the Line, and 2 Frigates, have been captured; and that Admiral and Vice-Admiral on board the British Fleet, and Admiral Duncan has anchored off Orfordness, and the rest are coming in

Great-Britain has now vanquished, in the course of three years, all the Navies of the World: The French by Lord Howe, June 1, 1794; the Spanish by Lord St. Vincent's, Feb. 14, 1797; and the Dutch by Admiral Duncan, October 11, 1797.

Thursday evening all the Troops in Garrison, viz. the detachment of Royal Artillery, commanded by Lieut. Col. Wright;—the 1st Fencible Cavalry, commanded by the Right Hon. the Earl of Roden;—the Royal Longford Militia, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Amuchty;—the South Cork Militia, commanded by the Right Hon. Lord Doneraile;—the Devon and Cornwall Fencibles, commanded by Col. Hall, with all the Yeomanry Corps of this City, commanded by Captain-Commandant Johnston, marched to the North Strand, Thomond-Bridge, and Arthur's-Quay, where they fired a grand feu-de-joye, on account of the happy,—the glorious intelligence of the victory over, and capture of the Dutch Fleet.—The City was brilliantly illuminated, and exhibited every where those lively demonstrations of joy which accorded with the general feelings on this most important event.
