The report of the Dutch Admiral's ship the Vryheid, having sunk with all her crew on board, is, we are happy to state, totally void of foundation, that ship having arrived at Yarmouth yesterday.

This morning we received, by express, Paris Journals of the 14th and 15th instant.

Letters from Italy state, that the extent of the Cisalpine Republic increases daily.

The Papal throne, it appears, totters most dreadfully. Refugees from the dominions of his Holiness, and those of the King of Naples, daily arrive at Ancona, and enter into the patriotic legion of that place, for the purpose of combating, as they say, their Tyrants.

The Treaty of Peace between France and Portugal has not yet been ratified by the Court of Lisbon.

The Negotiations at Udina have not yet been broken off. Great preparations, however, are making by both parties for another campaign.

The Dutch Captains are most of them coming to London on their parole, having near connections in town.

In the course of the engagement, Admiral Onslow's ship was at one time in the most imminent danger, being attacked by four of the Dutch ships at once. During this contest she took fire, and was towed out of the line.

Tuesday night a Dutch sailor, armed with a sword, planted himself on the road side near Deptford, where he attacked every passenger with the most brutal ferocity. He stabbed a young woman in the breast, and wounded several Gentlemen, but none mortally. After a desperate resistance, he was at length overpowered by numbers, and conveyed to the watch-house, where he declared it was his intention to destroy every person he met, in revenge for the defeat of his countrymen.

The coarse pleasantry of our sailors is proverbial: Jack will have his joke, though Death stands staring him in the face: thus, in the late glorious contest with the Dutch, a Jack Tar on board the Venerable, whenever Admiral Winter returned the fire, as repeatedly was heard to exclaim—"Well done, little breeches!"
