

in the 65th year of his age. He received a slight wound in the bottom of his belly in the late engagement, but it is not supposed that his health was in the slightest degree affected by that accident. He died of an apoplectic complaint, to which he had long been subject, and under which he laboured with particular severity during the last fortnight of his life. The state of his health on his embarking on board the fleet in the Texel was such, that it was deemed necessary to appoint Admiral Munier to assist him in the executive department of his office. The body is to be opened this day. He was attended by Dr. Blane, Surgeons Home, Earle, and O'Donnell, and Mr. Smith, the Apothecary, at whose house he died.

LIMERICK, — November 15.

Captain Worsley, of the Bengal Native Infantry, arrived last night at Dennis Lyons, Jun. Esq.'s, the Hon. East-India Company's Agent at this Port, with an account of the safe arrival of the Hon. Company's Ship Ranger, Captain Bythewood, yesterday morning in this River, from Bengal:—The Ranger sailed from Bengal the 11th April, arrived at the Cape the 29th July, and sailed from thence the 21st August.—She left at the Cape the Barrington, Thetis, Dublin, Bridgewater, Fort-William, Rockingham, Airly Castle, and Melville Castle, Company's Ships;—the Fame, Ocean, Alexander, Loyalist, Edmund and George, Princess of Wales, Prince Frederick, and Exeter, Extra Ships.—The above Ships were to sail from the Cape of Good Hope the middle of September, for England, under convoy of His Majesty's Ship Dordrecht, Captain Brisbane.

The Ranger spoke, about ten days ago, His Majesty's Ship Romney, Admiral Sir James Wallace, and the Triton Navy Transport, from Newfoundland, all well.—Captain Worsley, being charged with Dispatches for Government, from Rear-Admiral Pringle, and for the East-India Company, set off immediately Express for London.

The Ranger fell in with the brig Granville Bay, from Jamaica to London, taken by a French privateer on the 28th of last month, the Granville Bay was then in a very leaky situation when the Ranger fell in with her, she took the Frenchmen out, when she sunk immediately after.
