It appears by the last English Paper, that Go-
vernment are going to contract for Beef in
Russia, where it is only one halfpenny per lb.—
This must materially affect our markets.

We are concerned to hear, that the greatest
disorder prevails in some parts of the County
of Cork; by a Letter from an Officer of the
Light Company of the Limerick Militia, we are
informed that the troops are on duty every
night, and apprehend several Persons charged
with being Defenders.

By the late Stamp Act, a duty of one Guinea
is charged on Marriage Licenses; but this was
intended for Prerogative Licenses only, and the
mistake was afterwards rectified by the Revenue
Bill, chap. 30, sec. 278, which enacts, that no
higher duty than 2s. 6d. shall be paid for a
Marriage License issuing out of a Consistorial
Court.

In consequence of the increase of Civil Bills in

sions to submit to any unnecessary consumption of
time. The Suitors of the Court are therefore here-
by cautioned, that they will not be any longer in-
dulged in their habit of not coming in till the se-
cond or third day of the Sessions, as the Court will
go into Civil Bills at nine o'clock the first day, and
as soon as there is no Business to be done, the Book
will be ruled.—The Clerk of the Peace will always
attend in the Sessions Town the day before, in
order to enter the Civil Bills.

sumed) by common Messengers, unknown and un-
responsible, the Clerk of the Peace is ordered hence-
forth not to receive any Informations that are not
decorously transmitted.

o'clock the first day, and the Defaulters fined, with-
out any probability of the Fines being discharged,
but on Affidavits, setting forth a sufficient Excuse.
