

COUNTRY NEWS.

Cork, Jan. 3. We are informed of a laughable mistake which happened lately by the misspelling of a word. In copying an Inventory of different articles saved out of a vessel wrecked near Kingsale, the Clerk inadvertently wrote Hose which attracted the attention of some of our Hosiery who galloped off to the place of sale, but were woefully disappointed on being presented with a large parcel of Iron Hoes, instead of Stockings.

Waterford, Jan. 3. Tuesday five prisoners were brought in here from Kilkenny, and confined in the guard-house; they are to be sent to New Geneva.

Yesterday evening a fine little boy, about four years old was found drowned in the river; the body did not appear to have been long in the water. Though the circumstance was made as public as possible through the town, still no person appeared to own the infant.

Thursday, 8 prisoners (four of them from the city gaol) were escorted from hence to New Geneva, by a detachment from Captain Wallace's corps of yeomen.
